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TEACHERS ARE UNDER CHARGE

France Blames School Heads for the Bolshevism That Is Rampant in That Country.

PARIS. (AP)—The spread of Bolshevism in France is beginning to attract the attention of political leaders and government authorities.

The eventuality of a dangerous growth of communism in this country always has been regarded as very remote because of the natural conservative tendency of the farming element, which outnumbered the laboring class. Lately, however, evidence has been discovered that the Bolshevism virus has penetrated the peasantry, though until now to be proof against all subversive doctrine.

This outbreak is attributed to the influence of school teachers, who are drifting more and more toward extreme radicalism. An example was furnished the other day when a monument to the school teachers killed on the battlefield was to be inaugurated in the Department of Morbihan. The school teachers association of the department decided by a large majority that the inauguration should not be allowed to take place unless the inscription, "To the School Teachers Who Fell on the Field of Battle," was changed to "To the Victims of the War." They also demanded that there be no mention of France or the "fatherland" in any speeches, and that the Marsellaise be neither played nor sung.

The unsuspectedly large proportion of the teachers of that department won to Bolshevism has started an inquiry into the state of mind of teachers generally, and one functionary of the department of education said the communists were certainly in the majority by a considerable margin. In some departments teachers have prepared their own texts for dictation to pupils in which they have carefully cut out everything that in the regular text books smacks of patriotism or history. Even the word "international" is becoming unpopular with these extremists because of the last three syllables.

The fight between classes is the prevailing sentiment in the examples of these impoverished text books that have come to the notice of the authorities. How to deal with the situation is a hard problem. The present government is inclined to the greatest leniency in such matters, and the school teachers' influence in rural districts is such that there are no means of combating him on his own ground.

The Communists took 500,000 votes from the Socialists in the recent elections, and the coalition of the latter with the Radicals is expected to drive a great many more toward Bolshevism before another election is held. In this the school teachers' influence is not felt, but it is thought that the present generation of country school children will, if there is not a reaction in the meantime, swell the communist ranks immensely when it becomes of voting age.

Apple Profits Assured. HOOD RIVER, Ore.—Conditions which a couple of weeks ago pointed to an apple harvest earlier than usual were removed by the recent rains, which are expected to delay maturity of the fruit. The showers, although light, will be of great benefit to growers in this district. Crops of 50,000 boxes, originally predicted for 1924, Wash., is expected to be cut somewhat as a result of the prolonged drought. Any fears for lack of rolling stock this year were dispelled by W. W. Graham, car distributor for the Pacific Fruit Express company who was here yesterday.

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MAY OBTAIN HELIUM GAS

Scientists Hope to Extract a Valuable Gas from Shale Found in Black Hills.

DEADWOOD, S. D. (AP)—Scientists of the Black Hills of South Dakota are offering the last hope that a supply of helium gas is available near here for use of the war and navy departments in further experiments with lighter-than-air craft. This discovery was made by Dr. Dorsey Lygon, an assistant director of the federal bureau of mines, while investigating the possibility of locating "blue ores" cheaply enough so that their valuable metals may be extracted at a profit.

Hasty analysis of gas taken from wells driven near St. Onge and Dell'Fouche, S. O., showed it useless, impossible to locate and of a lower specific gravity than ordinary illuminating gas, Dr. Lygon said. Laboratory tests are to be made to determine definitely whether the gas is helium, and whether it exists in sufficient quantity to make developments feasible.

LIPPER'S PAROLE SOUGHT. SALEM, Ore.—It was reported here that an effort is being made to obtain a parole or pardon for Floyd Henderson, who is serving a life term in the state penitentiary for the part he played in the slaying of Sheriff T. J. Taylor of Umatilla county. It was said that W. H. Taylor, brother of the murdered sheriff, would not oppose the pardon.

Henderson was in the Umatilla county jail at the time Owens, Rathie and Kerby overpowered the jailer, broke from the institution and later shot and killed Sheriff Taylor. Persons interested in obtaining the pardon said that Henderson took no active part in the slaying, but was forced to accompany the other members of the gang under penalty of being killed. Owens, Rathie and Kerby were hanged for the murder, while Henderson received a life sentence.

Milton Tax Levy Reduced. MILTON, Ore.—The city council with the budget committee consisting of C. D. Hobbs, M. D. Kaiser, T. W. Hewitt, Victor Orr, and Mrs. S. S. Shields, when it was found a levy of 15 mills will be necessary to take care of the operating expenses of the city during 1925, based upon a valuation of \$1,000,000. This is 2.4 mills less than that levied for the year 1924.

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La Follette Wins Vote. PENDLETON, Ore.—Tourists that drive through Pendleton will vote for La Follette in greater numbers than for Coolidge, according to a straw vote taken during the last few days by C. H. Holtz at his service station on the Old Oregon trail.

Of a total of 465 votes cast by tourists, 266 went to La Follette, 155 to Coolidge and 100 to Davis.

CHINA PHEASANTS FREED. HOOD RIVER, Ore.—Gene Harrison passed through here with a water truck bound for Mosier, carrying 284 young China pheasants.

The game birds, raised at the state game farm at Corvallis, were released in the Mosier orchard sections. They were the first pheasants released by the game commission in that district.
