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Beauty Hints

USING YOUR POWDER.
How do you powder?
Does your powder seem to slip off as soon as you put it on? Or, what is just as bad, does it clog up?

If so, the trouble is probably with the kind of powder base. For some women vanishing cream, usually recommended as an ideal powder base, is too heavy, and the cleansing cream which remains on the face after cleansing proves a splendid base for powder. Some women, though their number is very small, can do without any cream foundation for powder. However, some sort of a cream base is an almost necessary protection to the skin from the ravages of sun and wind.

Although some women have no trouble with their powder when used alone, when more is applied, says, there's the rub! The rouge and powder seems to coagulate, forming a violent cake-like pink. If your rouge and powder are the right shades but the combined result is unsatisfactory, change your methods of make-up, for there are almost as many different ones as there are types of women, and the thing to do is to experiment until you find a method that suits you. Some women apply their rouge first, and powder afterwards. Some even put on a bit of rouge again, after powdering.

Others find it more successful to completely, but lightly powder the face, then apply the rouge, and a top of this fluff a thin film of powder over the rouge, blending it softly at the edges.

However, whichever method best suits, here's a hint for the final stage: Take a clean dust of cotton, and fluff off all the powder which seems at all superfluous, being careful to get the bits of powder out of the corners of your eyes and off your eyebrows and eyelashes.

Has your powdering been successful? It has only if it means this—that your face gives the effect of a face that has been powdered, rather than one that is powdered!

MEETINGS HELD AT ENTERPRISE

Plans Made for Cooperation of Grange and Fair Board.

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special) — Several members of the fair board committee, appointed recently by C. F. Davies, Pomona grange master, met August 20th, at Enterprise, with members of the County Fair Board, for the purpose of working out details whereby the granges of the county may cooperate with the fair board in making the fair exhibit larger. The precinct prizes which have been offered by the fair board for the past number of years, will remain the same this year, as in former years, but in addition to this exhibit, each subordinate grange of the county has been asked to fill a booth with farm products. The precinct prizes are offered under the following classifications, relative to location and precinct. All precincts in the county being in direct competition, but with each exhibit being judged according to a comparative standard of perfection, based upon the character of the products of each section. What are popularly known as lowland precincts, consisting of Promise, Crooked, Lost Prairie and Imnaha districts, being judged according to the following table: Fruit, 50 points; vegetables, 20 points; grain, 20 points; hay, 10 points. The upland precincts consisting of Joseph, Enterprise, Lostone, Wallawa, Flora and Paradise, and any other precinct coming under the heading of upland districts, will be scored as follows: Grain, 50 points; hay, 20 points; vegetables, 20 points; and fruit 10 points. In judging the foregoing, variety will be counted as 40 points, quality 40 points, and display 20 points. The following are the cash prizes offered for precinct exhibits: First, \$125; second, \$100; third, \$75; fourth \$50, and fifth \$25. Despite the substantial cash prizes which have been offered for the above named exhibits, there has been a gradual falling off of the farm exhibits shown. In order to encourage a more general exhibit of farm products and keep the fair up to the standard of an agricultural showing, the board has offered a special prize of a silver trophy cup for the best grange booth shown at the fair this fall. It is stated that the cup must be won for a series of three years, by one grange, before it becomes its property. The exhibits shown in the grange booths may consist of grains, hays, fruits, vegetables and any kind of farm products, also modern conveniences, labor saving devices, tools, etc. Judging of the grange booths will be scored according to the following table: Variety, 40 points; display, 20 points. The products shown collectively thru the grange booths will bear a card giving name of grower, variety, where grown, and under what conditions. Whether the present arrangements relative to precinct exhibits will remain a permanent part of the fair, will depend to a large extent upon what the granges are able to do in the way of gathering a creditable showing of farm products.

Members of the fair board have stated that if the showing made by the granges is highly satisfactory, and can be depended upon to furnish the exhibits, it is probable that a change may be made whereby the cash prizes now offered to the precincts will be offered to the different granges exhibiting. In order to stimulate and encourage more profitable grain and forage crop production in the county, the county court has announced that the following contest is open to exhibitors from Umatilla, Union, Baker and Wallawa counties. The following prizes are offered on the grain special: Fall wheat, any hard variety, first prize of \$20; second \$10; third \$5; fall wheat of any soft variety a like prize; also for the following classes of grain: spring wheat of both hard and soft varieties, barley of bearded and bald varieties, also for oats and rye. In order to encourage the production of fewer varieties of potatoes, and to help bring the potato production to a point where it will be possible to produce potatoes which may be sent to the larger market in car load lots, the county court has offered prizes of \$10 and \$5 for disease-free samples of the following varieties: Burbanks and Nettled for varieties to the great number of varieties of potatoes grown in the county at this time very few commercial potatoes are available. All farmers are asked to make as many exhibits as possible in the general exhibits as well as in the grange exhibits.

Davies, Pomona master, and several other members of a committee for the purpose of organizing new granges in the county, is said to be proving highly satisfactory. At a meeting held recently at Alder Slope about thirty members are said to have been signed up. The committee made a trip to Flora the past week where they found all farmers busy with threshing. A small turnout as reported at the meeting held there last upon visiting a number of the farmers it was learned that many were keenly interested, and that only the business of the season had prevented them from attending the meeting. It is probable that another meeting will be held in that section at a later date for the purpose of organizing. Crops in that section of the county are said to be producing very satisfactory

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fields with many of the fields going around twenty-five and thirty bushels per acre. Some seedling of fall wheat has also been done there, with the grain making a good germination.

COURTS RUN BY LABORERS

MOSCOW (AP) — "Comrade" Smynoff, chairman of the Moscow district court, gives some interesting figures in his annual report concerning the personnel of the Moscow Soviet courts. Of the 237 judges, 100 are laborers and 37 are peasants. Nearly 175 are members of the communist party, while 50 are members of the so-called intelligentsia.

Out of 7345 men available for jury duty in Moscow, Smynoff's report says, 3021 are drawn from the membership of the communist party, 6197 are workers and peasants and 1648 are clerical or other employes.

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
