representative. If the Democratic convention had not already been held, J. Han might be given the vice presidential nomination in return for the showing his whiskers made abroad.

Tim, however, is taking the high-lights out of the board that was once the pride of J. Han's life. The glowing facts that once won for him the title of "pink whiskers" are now subdued as the graying twilight of his years advances. Age, however, has not yet touched the jauntyness of J. Han's spirit, and the graying beard is flaunted with all the abandonment with which it was worn even in his pinkest days.

Some searches of the records, delving for light as to what may happen should La Follette succeed in deadlocking the presidential election this fall, has turned up the generally unknown fact that David H. Atchison, a senator from Missouri, for whom Atchison, Kas., was named, is entitled to be included in the list of presidents of the United States.

Atchison was president pro-tempore of the Senate through the twenty-ninth, thirtieth and thirty-second congresses.

The fourth of March, 1849, falling on a Sunday, Zachary Taylor was not sworn in as president until the following day, March 5. In the meantime the term of James K. Polk had expired at noon on March 4.

The Congressional Biographical Directory, compiled under authority of congress and therefore official records of Atchison:

"This office (president pro-tempore of the senate) made him president of the United States during Sunday, March 4, 1849, as General Taylor was not sworn in to office until the following day."

All of which is now presented as a precedent for the accession to the presidency, next March 4, of President Pro-tempore Cummings of Iowa, should a deadlock in both houses of congress follow a deadlock in the electoral college.

CRIPPLED TOTS HELPED
OREGON CITY, Ore.—Through the big heartedness of the Shrine order, several of Clackamas county's crippled children have received medical attention at the Shrine hospital for crippled children La Portland. Among them is Lulu Butler, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Butler of Canby. She has been spending a few days here visiting her sister, Mrs. W. J. Burns.

The little girl when but three months old was afflicted with infantile paralysis. She recovered, but the disease left her a cripple. By the operation performed at the Shrine hospital her leg has been straightened.

Another child from Clackamas county who is in the big hospital is George Simpson of this city, a little fellow who is known as Oregon City's youngest hero, and who has recently undergone one of the most remarkable surgical operations at the institution.







PULLMAN, Wash.—Mrs. Charlotte Mitzberg, age 64, wife of Martin I. Mitzberg, a farmer five miles south of Pullman, dropped dead from heart failure while doing her housework. The family has resided near here two years, coming from Moscow, where they lived nearly 20 years.

Mrs. Mitzberg is survived by her husband, two daughters and four sons. One daughter, Mrs. Claude Hayes, lives near here. The funeral will be held from Funtall's chapel Sunday, the Rev. W. L. Monbeck officiating.

Apple Workers' Wages Reduced.
WENATCHEE, Wash.—Wages for apple picking, sorting and packing, as agreed upon by members of the growers' committee of the chamber of commerce and some packing organizations, were announced as follows:
Picking by hour, 25 cents; picking by box, 4 cents; packing from grader, 4 cents; bench packing, 6 cents. While the wages are lower than 1923, it is believed that they are consistent with prospective fruit profits and with the labor supply.

The growers' committee favors formation of a fire protection district within a radius of five miles around Wenatchee, and would assess growers to buy the fire truck and keep it working fund.
