International Polo to Begin On September 6

NEW YORK (AP).—Great Britain and the United States each has won four series of polo matches since the famous international challenge cup, which will be at stake in the 1924 play at the Meadow Brook club beginning September 6, was put into competition in 1922.

One of these contests, however, played in 1920 and won by England, does not rank as an official cup affair, so that the standing in the trophy series up to this year gives America the advantage with four triumphs to three. The 1920 play was prompted by the initiative of certain Americans, including Foxhall Keene, who were in England at the time, and they lost the only game played.

The international cup, one of the most coveted of athletic trophies, first was offered for competition between the two countries in 1922 by the Westchester Polo club of Newport, R. I. That year the Huntington club, of England, sent over a team which won two straight matches and took the trophy overseas.

The next official series was played in 1922 when Britain successfully defended her honors, winning two out of three matches from a team headed by Foxhall Keene and Larry Waterbury, two names famous in American polo history.

A lapse of seven years followed during which America, under the leadership of Harry Payne Whitney, built up its original and famous "Big Four." This combination, composed of Whitney, Larry and Monty Waterbury and Davros, Milburn, won the cup back from England in 1929 and successfully defended it in 1931 and 1932 without sustaining a single defeat.

This combination was shifted the following year, when England, again challenged, and after two hard-fought matches, broke through for her first triumph in a dozen years. America still had her "Big Four" available, but as a team they had passed the crest of their ability, and the substitution of Louis Stoddard and Rene LaMontagne at No. 1 failed to check the tide of defeat.

The war caused another long interval, but in 1921 the United States mounted a new team, which won two matches decisively from Britain and brought the trophy once again to this country. This new "Big Four" was composed of Milburn and Stoddard, veterans of international play, and two new stars, J. Watson Webb, left-handed player,

men were no less enthusiastic in their greetings than the women. Around the White House crowds were thickened. Police regulations had forbidden any entry to the White House lawn, but thousands were jammed along the sidewalks. Every foot of ground in the vicinity of the executive mansion was occupied and the most eager and climbed trees for a better view.

President Coolidge, Mrs. Coolidge and their son John, awaited the prince in the green room of the White House. Secretary Hughes introduced the prince to the presidential family and then retired, leaving the prince to be entertained at luncheon by the Coolidge family alone.

The route was secured by the efforts of the Commercial Association, who were obliged to get the road opened through the Weaty and Maxwell places to complete the circuit. In their efforts the Association has had the cooperation of the farmers along the route, especially where the new road was necessary. The people who have subscribed for the balance are asked to pay the amount pledged at the bank. Through the kindness of Jay Billings the fence for the portion of the new road through the Maxwell place was secured at cost through a Forest Service contract, as was also done by the Wallowa Hardware on the portion previously built through the Weaty ranch. The Forest Service also loaned two men, the Woods brothers, to do the fence work. Frank Root also assisted greatly by donating a number of posts.

Manufacturers' Association's barometer leaped up to 193 per cent of normal, compared with production at 97 per cent and shipments at 82 per cent of the same mark. The cause was reported to be the better buying from country yards in the middle West and East, rather than to any improvement in industrial consumption. This trend is still evidenced in this market, and common western prices have taken two advances during the month.

While city trade remains on its previous level, there is a good deal more activity in the country districts due to the greater prosperity of the agricultural population. This business nevertheless is not developing with the rapidity that was earlier expected, apparently because of the doubtful situation of the corn crop. Even in the wheat sections, the disposition as yet seems to do needed repair work, but to let new construction wait a while longer. However, the
