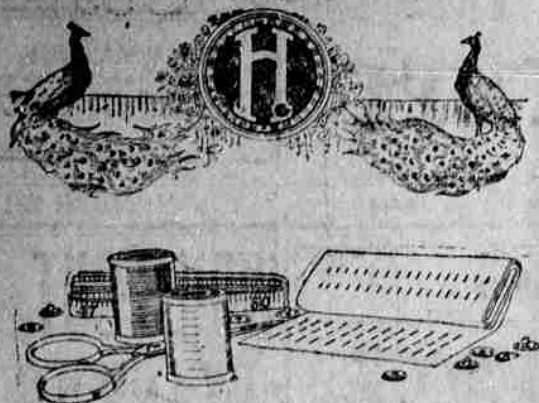

EPINARD RUNS—BUT NOT FIRST

Wise Counsellor Won International Race Yesterday at Odds of 13 to Five.

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press).—Frederick A. Burton's horse, Wise Counsellor, who was the favorite, won the big international race at Belmont park Monday morning.

The time for the six furlongs was 1:11 4-5. The race carried a money value of \$29,000. Sixty thousand persons, including the Prince of Wales, saw the turf classic.

Epineard, despite his defeat, demonstrated he is a great runner. Quoted with Zev at 2 to 1, the

champion 3-year-old of France in 1923, lost the race only after a heartbreaking drive with Wise Counsellor down the stretch.

Epineard got away well, running third by a head at the quarter. Baffling leading. Wise Counsellor, running easily was fifth by a half at the quarter pole. Baffling held his lead until the field straightened out in the stretch.

At this point Baffling was leading by a head. Zev was second, closely followed by Epineard. Wise Counsellor was a length behind Epineard on the outside. Frankie Keogh on Wise Counsellor, gave the horse a shove to the right, snatched the field and with a free rein headed him straight to the wire.

Everett Haynes, the American jockey upon Epineard, applied the whip to the speeding flank of the Wertheimer colt and the champion son of Epine Match, his American dam, showed that he had plenty of run. He matched stride for stride with Wise Counsellor for 100 yards as the colts came down the stretch. But Wise Counsellor's long stride slowly carried the American horse away until he was half a length ahead at the wire.

Epineard was three lengths ahead of Jaskin, with Knob 11 in fourth place, half a length ahead of Zev, who pulled up in the stretch.

Wilderness was sixth, Baffling seventh, Miss Star, the only filly in the race, eighth, and Goshawk trailing the field. Little Chief, Italia and Westmore were scratched just before the start.

TILDEN WINS SEMI-FINALS

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (By the Associated Press).—William T. Tilden was forced to five thrilling, gripping sets Monday before he conquered his youthful former pupil, Vincent Richards, in the semi-finals of the national tournament.

But the crown that had been worn for four successive seasons came perilously close to toppling from his head before he beat Richards, who not only took two sets from the titleholder but came within a point of winning a third. Tilden, however, racing the clock, cut his hair and after he took five sets to turn back Johnston in the 1923 title, rose to the greatest heights of his brilliancy to check the young Olympic champion. The scores were 6-5, 6-2, 8-6, 4-6, 6-4.

Tilden's victory followed a crushing triumph in the other semi-final match by Johnston, who another Gerald L. Patterson, leader of the Australian Davis cup forces, by a score of 6-2, 6-0, 6-0.

Thus while "Big Bill" was being given the right of his life, his rival "Little Bill," in allowing the giant Australian only two games, was scoring one of the most convincing, amazing triumphs of his career.

Trinidad Honors Its Heroes Who Fell in World War

PORT-OF-SPAIN, Trinidad, B. W. I. (AP).—In memory of those who fell and in honor of those who served in the great war, Trinidad has erected a beautiful monument. It is located in the center of a park at Port-of-Spain, surrounded by tropical scenery.

The unveiling of the monument was one of the last public acts in the colony of Governor Sir Samuel Henry Wilson, who left here July 10 to take over the governorship of the Island of Jamaica.

The monument consists of a tall, square white column, on top of which is a female figure of victory with outstretched wings and the left arm bearing a wreath. Four broad steps surround the massive base, which supports on one side the giant figure of a Trinidad soldier protecting a wounded companion.

The cost was \$50,000, raised jointly by public subscription and government contribution.

BREAK RECORD IN HILL CLIMB

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP).—Breaking all past records and setting a mark that drivers say will be hard to beat in future years, Otto Loesch, of Connorsville, Ind., veteran automobile racing driver, won Monday's Peak hill climb of 12 miles in 18 minutes and 15 seconds. Loesch finished two-fifths of a second ahead of C. H. Myers of Colorado Springs and by his victory, won permanent possession of the \$5000 Fenrose silver trophy. He drove the last three miles, including a part of the famous "W" curve, our best hill road and hit a rock. Loesch and Myers battered the time made by Ralph Mulford in 1916 which stood until Monday as the record. Mulford's time was 18:24.7.

MURPHY TAKES AUTO CLASSIC

SPEEDWAY, Altoona, Pa. (By the Associated Press).—Thrills aplenty held 70,000 spectators at most breathless Monday afternoon as the 250-mile Labor day auto mobile race came to a close with Jimmy Murphy the winner.

As the last few laps of the grind were being rolled off Joe Boyer, in second place, made a desperate effort to overtake Murphy's lead of more than a mile and a half.

Traveling at a rate of 125 miles an hour, Boyer, within sight of the main grandstand, crashed thru the guard rail at the top of the bank. He was pinned in the wreckage and the spectators were in suspense as the other racers passed below the racing machine which hung as if from a slender thread over the track. Boyer, his legs injured, was conscious as he was rushed to a hospital where it was said both his legs were crushed and his condition was considered serious.

Murphy's time was two hours, 11 minutes and 58 2-5 seconds.

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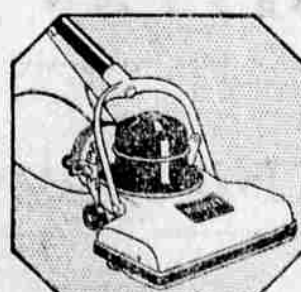
