this afternoon appeared to be preparing for another night of continued fighting. The firing is more intense hourly.

Both sides are using artillery, mainly three-inch guns.

Explosive artillery shells were used for the first time today, a large number of machine guns were also placed in service.

No evidence has been produced yet that cooperation is being accorded. Kiangsu forces by naval contingents reported assembled at Nanking for action down the Yangtze river.

Heavy reinforcements.

Kiangsu troops under General Chu Shih Yuan appeared to be concentrating on the Leikou sector.

Heavy reinforcements are being brought up from the attack base at Quinsan. Due to heavy fighting the number of wounded has been increased considerably.

Dr. Wellington Koo, minister of foreign affairs of this Peking government today sent the foreign legations assurances that the government will take all precautions for protection of lives and property of foreigners in the battle zone.

Court Declares Cove Road Well Constructed

road construction was started with no money and no feeling other than that we feel that No. 2 is not being constructed according to the adopted plans and specifications, and as citizens of Cove we demand that the road be built in the proper manner.

The above statement was made last evening by John Dean, one of the plaintiffs in the case filed Wednesday to enjoin the county court from suppressing any further estimates or making any further advances to Clyde H. Seltz and the Newport Construction company.

Mr. Dean further stated that Unit No. 1, which was built by the Newport Construction company, apparently is all right and a very satisfactory piece of road.

"What we want and what we think we are entitled to have," continued Mr. Dean, "is as good a road on the east end as the one finished on the west end, and the

specifications call for the same construction.

Wants First Class Road.

"I would like to say further that there is no disposition to prevent Mr. Seltz from continuing on with his contract and completing the road, but we shall insist that the work be properly done. There is not a man in Cove who is not willing that any engineer named by Engineer Baldock of the State Highway department should go on this job as inspector and have it built to the letter of the plans and specifications. Cove people want a road. They want no bickering or trouble. We have had all the ups and downs we are entitled to have, and more to, over this highway, and we are all content now to accept the gravel road provided it is constructed in a first-class manner."
