FILL SCHOOLS AT ENTERPRISE

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special to the Observer).—The Enterprise schools opened Monday with a healthy enrollment, states the Enterprise Record-Advertiser. A check-up of figures Wednesday morning showed 126 in the high school and 276 in the grades or a total of 402, as against 426 for the opening last year, with 262 grade pupils and 107 in the high school.

In 1922, which was the lowest ebb of the depression period, the total registration was only 372. The year before, 1921, was slightly better with 439 enrolled. The registration for 1920 was 508 while in 1919 the high mark was reached with a total enrollment of 541.

Supt. F. L. Bennett estimated that the registration would reach 150 in the high school and 400 in the grades in a few weeks time. This would match the high mark of 1919.

The grade enrollment was as follows: Eighth grade, Mrs. Butterfield, 28.

Seventh grade, Mrs. Goodman and Mrs. Rogers, 51.

Sixth grade, Mrs. Andrews, 35.

Fifth grade, Mrs. Lindley, 45.

Fourth grade, Mrs. Davis, 28.

Third and fourth grades, Miss Pratt, 25.

Third grade, Miss Johnson, 20.

Second grade, Mrs. Ogan, 27.

Second grade, Mrs. Reavis, 28.

First grade, Mrs. Scott, 34.

First grade, Mrs. Hyatt, 29.

In the high school there are now enrolled 16 seniors, 29 juniors, 25 sophomores and 46 freshmen. The high school is under the direction of the following teachers:

Miss Ward, commercial and Latin.

Miss Miller, domestic science and English.

Miss Hawley, English.

Clarence Fitzgerald, history.

L. D. Hollenberg, agriculture and biology.

Fred Patten, science, mathematics and athletic coach.

Mr. Bennett, mathematics and Caesar.

The commercial courses which were added to the course offered this fall are proving very popular and many students are signing up for this branch. There are 26 in the typing class, 3 in bookkeeping, 19 taking shorthand. The first year of domestic art has 22 enrolled while the second year domestic art and science has only a small number signed up. The agriculture classes received the highest enrollment of all, as the number of students who desired this branch of work surpassed all expectations.

The manual training department has been doing away with and the agriculture department will occupy the room formerly used by this branch. The hunkabow which had been used for agriculture in former years will not be in use this year.

The agriculture students are remodeling the shop so that it will suit their needs. The front part of the shop will be used for a classroom and the other half will be retained for shop work. It is planned to give two days of shop work to all classes while the advanced class will be nearly all shop work, dealing with woodwork and work with farm implements. At present the advanced class is working at repairing and rebuilding the playground apparatus.

Football prospects look good for this fall, according to Coach Fred Patten. Seven old letter men are back in the lineup and there are a number of good prospects out for practice. The old men back are Hart, Reavis, Fred and Howard Wagner, McCoy and Collinsworth. Likely prospects are Hoyde, Steel, Boyd, Blue, Bornstet and Taylor.

Practice was started Monday with 24 men out in the mobsking. Most of them are not in good physical condition but it is expected that they will soon round into shape. It is planned on having the game with the alumni in about two weeks. The entire football schedule has not been arranged as yet. Coach Patten comes to Enterprise with an enviable reputation as a player at Willamette university and a coach of the freshman team there.

Saturday afternoon the principals and coaches of the valley schools will meet at Walla Walla to arrange the county football schedule and to discuss girls' athletics.
