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## FIRPO STILL RING ENIGMA

NEW YORK (AP)—Luis Angel Firpo, who meets Harry Wills at Boyle's Thirty Acres September 11, remains the enigma of the prize ring although he is a veteran of 22 battles during the five years of his career.

When the giant Argentine enters the ring to fight Wills for the right to challenge Jack Dempsey for the heavyweight championship of the world, his course of action will be hidden behind an inscrutable mask. His chances of victory will rest upon the use he makes of a tremendous right hand and powerful body.

Violating orthodox methods of training, ignoring ring technique and acquiring scientific boxing, Firpo, once a stevedore on the docks at Buenos Aires, employed the elemental equipment of a fighting heart, a rugged body and a powerful right hand, to battle his way through waves of criticism and knock the marvel of modern heavyweight boxing, Dempsey, out of a ring a year ago.

Born October 25, 1885 in Argentina, of an Italian father and a Spanish mother, Luis grew up as a bootblack, an odd job man and graduated to the many occupations of stevedores. Labor was arduous—overseers claim that Luis still shirks heavy work during his training periods—and in 1917, two months after he witnessed his first prize fight, Firpo entered the ring and was knocked out in the first round by Angel Rodriguez, now retired.

The setback only angered the future Wild Bull who boxed over a score of amateurs before his first professional fight in September, 1919, with an American, William Daly. Firpo won by a knock out in seven rounds and had added 11 other knockout victories to his record when he first came to this country in 1922.

Firpo was met by no hands or subtle urethras when he first arrived here. Landing unostentatiously, he trained in cellars, fought off hunger but never thought of abandoning the career which he had chosen. When an opening came he knocked out Santos Maxted, Italian Jack Herman and Joe Meenan before returning to Argentina, where he won his first big purse in beating Jim Tracy, an Australian.

Since that time Firpo has been in the public eye. He came to this country early in 1922 and knocked out Bill Brennan, Jack McAuliffe and halted a comeback by Jesse Willard. Before each fight he was regarded as a favorite and was readily predicted that Dempsey would easily conquer the cruise-walker from Argentina. But the champion was knocked down twice and lifted out of the ring before he beat the Wild Bull to the canvas for the seventh time, to win

by a knockout in two rounds in the most spectacular prize fight in history.

Firpo grew in business sagacity as he advanced in power. He manages his own affairs, combats the country in barnstorming tours and his financial deals with Tex Rickard and other promoters have attracted almost as much attention as his fights in the ring.

In the midst of negotiations for a return match with Dempsey, the "Wild Bull" suddenly announced that he was through with prize fighting; but when Rickard offered more attractive inducements, he changed his decision. In his own country he has been regarded as a national hero because of the attention he attracted to the South American continent. He is now implicated with immigration authorities here in a legal battle which has a woman in the background.

Firpo won 24 of his 32 battles by knockouts and seven by decisions. His knockout by Dempsey was the only reverse of his professional career. The coming bout with Wills is considered by the impatient "Wild Bull" as a mere preliminary to another championship affair with Dempsey.

### Consuls in Europe Active Against Passport Swindlers

PARIS (AP)—Since the new American immigration law went into effect, Europe has seen an outbreak of attempted passport frauds. So great has been the desire to reach the shores of the United States, on the part of would-be emigrants, that they are willing to pay for unscrupulous traffickers in false documents, American consular officers are engaged in running down rascals in Warsaw, Berlin, Hamburg, Brussels and Paris.

## BAKER COACH ON THE FIELD

## Loren Murchison Wins; World's Record Falls

WEST CHARGE, N. J. (AP)—Loren Murchison Sunday established a new world's record of 24.74 for the 250-yard dash at the final day of competition in the National Amateur Athletic union championship meet under direction of the Newark Athletic club. The time cut 7-10 of a second from the mark made a week ago by Charles Toddler.

Herb Meyer, national champion 250-yard runner, ran the 50-yard free hurdles in 9.9-10 seconds. The time for the unstandardized distance was announced at a world's record, subject to approval of the National Amateur Athletic union.

### Switzerland Has Record Year In Exports of Fruits and Nuts

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP)—Fruits from the Swiss valleys have been exported this year on a larger scale than in any other period. Many of these shipments have gone to Germany where there is a big demand for fruits of all kinds and where the Swiss exporters found a ready sale for much of their produce now that the Renten mark has replaced the worthless paper currency.

According to provisional estimates compiled here Switzerland this year will have an excess of about 15,000 car loads of elder fruit, 3000 cars of eating apples, 10,000 tons of plums and 4500 tons of walnuts for exportation. Paris and London as usual took a large share of the Swiss fruit crop.

## SPORT NEWS

### U. S. LEADS IN NET VICTORIES

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—Although 27 nations in all parts of the world have sought possession of the Davis Cup, emblem of team tennis supremacy, only three, the United States, Australia and Great Britain, ever held this coveted trophy, which will be defended by America in the challenge matches beginning Sept. 11 at Philadelphia.

Of these three, the United States, chiefly through its triumphant march of the last four years, leads with seven victories, while Australia has six to her credit and Britain five.

The historic cup, a perpetual trophy to be contested for by nations having recognized lawn tennis organizations, was donated by Dwight F. Davis, present assistant secretary of war, in 1900. Since that time it has been contested for 18 times, competition this year marking the fifteenth annual play for the trophy.

In 1900, the first year of the competition, but two teams, the British Isles and the United States, played, but since then nations have swung into line until this year 22 teams entered the lists to compete for world tennis honors.

The United States scored the first victory in 1900 at Boston when Dwight F. Davis, donor of the trophy; Holcombe Ward, holder with

Davis of the national doubles title in 1939, 1900 and 1909, and M. H. Whitman defeated the British team, three matches to none. In 1901 there were no challengers and the cup rested in this country. In 1902 the British Isles challenged again but the United States won its second victory.

From this point, however, America's tennis star was dimmed and supremacy passed first to the British Isles which, chiefly through the brilliant work of the famous Doherty brothers, held the cup from 1903 to 1906, and then to Australia, where Brookman and Wilding, gathering great reputation, kept the trophy from 1907 to 1911.

Britain finally broke through the Antipodean defense, and won the trophy in 1912, only to lose it the following year to the United States. But Australia came back with a great victory by Wilding and Brookman in 1914 at Forest Hills and, with the world war raising a sudden break in the series, held the cup until Fildes and Johnson fought it back to America in 1920.
