

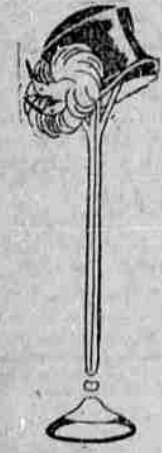


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TED THYE TO DEFEND TITLE

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special to the Observer)—People who come to Pendleton by the thousands to see the Round-Up are always seeking netton, and this year, in addition to the netton, the arena down at the big park where men and animals compete for mastery, they will be afforded an opportunity to see some strictly man sports. A wrestling tournament in which five light-heavyweight top-notchers will compete with the championship held by the high stakes has been arranged for Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

The tournament will be for the benefit of the Boy Scouts, and any profits made will be applied on the farm and cabin debt of that organization. Ted Thye, present champion, of Portland; Billy Edwards, former champion, of Kansas City; Mike Yaker, the grand old man of the net game, from Jackson Hole, Wyoming; Ray McCarron, the bulldozing wrestler of Pendleton; and Ralph Hand, speedy flash of Cottage Grove, are the contestants.

The tournament will not conflict in any way with any other Round-Up activities. Tickets will be one dollar each, no reserved seats, no preliminaries, according to Fred Bennett, chairman of the committee. All bouts will be held in the arena of Happy Canyon. All bouts must be to a decision, the word of the referee to go to the winner if the wrestlers can not make deciding throws.

The schedule of matches is as follows: Tuesday, Sept. 16, 9 p. m., McCarron meets Yaker. Wednesday, Sept. 17, 4 p. m., Hand meets Edwards. Thursday, Sept. 18, 10 a. m., winners of previous matches. Friday, Sept. 19, 10 a. m., Ted Thye meets winner for championship.

WILLS' REACH IS ADVANTAGE

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—Harry Wills and Luke Firpo will enter the ring for their 12-round bout at Boy's Thirty Acres tonight on a comparatively physical balance.

Each will weigh in the vicinity of 218 pounds, with Wills tending to surpass the figure and Firpo to reduce it. Wills, who shares with Jess Willard possession of the longest reach in the game, will have an advantage of five inches in this regard, and he also owns heavier arms than his rival, who has the larger torso. In chest, neck and height the men are nearly alike.
