### BROKE UP DANCE

Boat heels and a back-knife took a prominent part in a bloody battle staged by Millard McPetridge and Tom Tucker at the McPetridge home near Elk mountain Saturday night.

There was a dance in progress at the McPetridge home. It had been in progress for some time before Tucker appeared on the scene. Report has it that Tom was not expected at the dance, but he showed up late in the evening and announced his arrival by taking a position in the center of the dance arena and exclaiming "dance, you very nice ladies and gentlemen."

no, that wasn't what he said, exactly, but something to that effect. Millard, as host, felt constrained to protect his guests against any ungentlemanly conduct and accordingly invited Tucker to have off his overcoat and take a seat on the sidelines and make himself as inconspicuous as possible. Tom didn't take the suggestion very kindly and persisted in arguing. One word led to another and the first thing the dancers knew there was a first class scrap under way. The two men clinched and were soon rolling on the floor. McPetridge eventually gaining the top position. At this juncture, Tucker got hold of his knife and started slashing at Millard's head. The first stroke cut a gash from the upper part of the cheek to a point back of the ear, including a deep cut in the ear. Another slash found its way close to the jugular vein, while it is said a third effort resulted in burying the knife in McPetridge's shoulder. Some bystanders had the presence of mind to kick the knife out of Tucker's hand, at which time both belligerents got to their feet. Millard was slumped for an instant but when he recovered his senses he cut Tucker with a right upper cut and landed Tucker on the floor. Thereupon, McPetridge proceeded to change his antagonist's map by the very efficient method of training (eye man tromping). It is stated that Tucker suffered several broken ribs, a fractured collar bone and a badly disfigured countenance. He at least bears evidence of having been roughed up considerably.

McPetridge was rushed to town as soon as the fight was over and it was feared that he might bleed to death before a doctor could be reached. He lost about two quarts of blood and has some bad scratches on his neck and face.

A complete charging assault with a dangerous weapon was placed against Tucker and he was put under bonds of \$2500 to appear at the fall term of circuit court. D. G. Tucker and Ed Eben

posted the bonds and secured Tom's release from jail where he was lodged by the sheriff after bringing him in from the dance.

### American Invention Will Help Japanese Forecast Tremors

TOKIO, (AP)—Japan, more severely mauled by earthquakes than any other land, plans to turn in earnest to study the tremors, means of forecasting them, and methods for mitigating their disastrous effects.

Plans and estimates for a system of seismological research stations, to be placed in nine separate districts particularly affected by the earthquakes, will be laid before the imperial diet when it convenes next December.

Dr. Inamura, head of the seismological department of the University of Tokio, believes that earthquakes can be forecast with accuracy sufficient to permit precautions that will lessen their ill effects. This will be possible thru the equipment of these nine stations with the most modern seismological instruments. Every known method will be used to locate a disastrous tremor.

The feature of this equipment will be an American apparatus for recording movements of the earth's crust, designed by Dr. A. A. Michelson, head of the department of physics of the University of Chicago. This consists of two iron pipes each 592 feet long and six inches in diameter, laid across each other, imbedded in concrete and iron casing, and filled with oil and water. The instrument, according to Dr. Inamura, is so designed that the movement of the lines formed by the meeting of the oil and water in the pipes can be observed by means of an arrangement of prisms. The theory is that when the lines have shifted to certain positions the early approach of an earthquake is to be expected. Dr. Inamura says, however, that the exact time of the vibration cannot be forecast. A slight scratch will be needed for the installation of each station.

of taking care of their citizens from their own resources—made them eager to gain new lands, and that America, with her multitude of resources, land and undeveloped possibilities, was the cynosure of the eyes of such countries.

The colonel is an able speaker and his address last evening was not only applauded heartily, but the colonel had during the speech, points well taken brought vigorous acclamation from the audience.

He quoted a few words from the Bible showing that it is not unchristian to prepare for a possible defensive war and asserted that it was Christ-like to defend one's possessions against unprovoked attacks on the part of individuals.

"If it is not a sin to defend your possessions as an individual would it be a sin to defend your possessions as a nation of individuals?"

Pershing Lauded  
"Pershing could have retired as soon as the great war was over and his place in history would have been secured," Colonel McCullough stated. "That he did not do so because he believed that his duties were not ended. He believed that it was his duty to see that America never went into another war untrained and unprepared and Defense day is one of the results of his work."

Before closing the officer defended national Defense day in many ways, showing conclusively that it was proper and right that America should observe such a mobilization day as part of their defensive program.
