GOOD GRIDIRON SEASON SURE

(By Scoop)
La Grande high school is facing one of the toughest football seasons arranged in several years this fall, which is to terminate when Boise, Pandleton and Baker will meet during November. In addition to the above mentioned games, several earlier season games, all with teams that must be reckoned with have been scheduled including high schools in this and Walla Walla county.

As it appears at the present time, Boise and Pandleton will be the most serious opponents. Next on the list will come a rejuvenated Baker team that will undoubtedly play better football than has distinguished the school to the south for several years.

Boise, with nine lettermen back and with a reputation that is enviable in Idaho gridiron circles, will be here Armistice Day—November 11—and a team of major importance will result. The game will, of course, have no bearing upon the Eastern Oregon race but will nevertheless be extremely important inasmuch as this is the first time for years La Grande has engaged in a battle with a team from another state.

Boise a Winner.
Last year Boise met and defeated Pandleton, conceded the strongest eleven in Eastern Oregon. They likewise smothered Baker under a myriad of touchdowns. And Boise, with a team that will average around 155 pounds, has a reputation of being one of the fastest, hardest hitting organizations in the inland empire. Probably about the only black mark on their 1923 record was a defeat at the hands of the Odeño team which was due largely to the fact that the season was yet not far advanced and to the wonderful playing of one of the Oregon team's backs.

Over in Pandleton, the Buckaroos have nearly everything they had last year and a number of other players from Idaho and Rhinoceros schools, that will give them even more strength than last year. Barring accidents, and provided Hutton still cuts signals, the November 22 game at Pandleton will be the big Eastern Oregon game on the Tiger schedule.

Baker Not Easy.
La Grande players, who have taken much delight in defeating the Baker boys during the past few years on the football field by such scores as 72 to 6 and 54 to 6, will meet an entirely different sort of opposition this year. The reason Baker has a new coach.

H. L. Glendeman, former University of Idaho state fistic and a disciple of Knute Rockne, is expected to fill his eleven full of new ideas and ideas of fighting spirit. ELEVENS OUT FOR PRACTICE

SAN FRANCISCO (By the Associated Press)—Nine grid schools of the Pacific Coast football conference took the field Monday for the opening of practice for what promises to be the greatest year football has had on the Pacific coast. With the exception of the University of California, every school in the conference is expecting a team greatly improved over the 1923 season.

California, with but three veterans returning to college, is rated the weak side on paper. The danger of California's being checked in its attempt to win its fifth straight championship, however, is not in the lack of material at the Berkeley institution, but in the over-increasing power in the camps of its three great rivals, Stanford, Washington and University of Southern California.

S. C. Team Intact.
"Head-down" team at Southern California will be almost intact from last year. A veteran line returns to school and the Trojan's center has only to develop a full-back and quarterback and the team will be ready to take the field. Glenn "Pop" Warner, former University of Pittsburg coach, and now in charge of Stanford's destinies, rates the Southern team as "the team to beat." Others, however, do not agree with Warner and rate Warner's team as the likely winner of the championship.

For the first time in years, a Stanford varsity will start the season as the favorite. A veteran line and backfield, already groomed and trained in the "Warner system," awaited the coming of the eastern coach. Two guards and Campbell, quarterback, are missing from the team which California defeated last year, 9 to 6. Nevins, the star Stanford back, returns to college, and it is around him that Warner probably will build his attack. Warner, himself, is not willing to predict the fate of his team as he said he knew too little about other teams. Rival coaches, however, have no hesitancy in saying that Stanford will have her greatest American football team this year.

Washington Formidable.
Emmett Bershaw's Washington team looms on the northern horizon as a great menace to any team aspiring for the championship. Two veteran players are lost to the Washington team, but otherwise the team will be intact. George Wilson, one of the best line plungers on the coast, will be the star of the backfield.

Idaho, surprise of last year, will again present a formidable line-up and, though light, the team is likely to cause trouble this year. Washington State, Oregon and Oregon Aggies are at this time unknown quantities.

Coaches agree that the 1924 season on the Pacific coast will develop the closest race the conference has seen. The winner of the championship should rank as one of the leading elevens of the country.

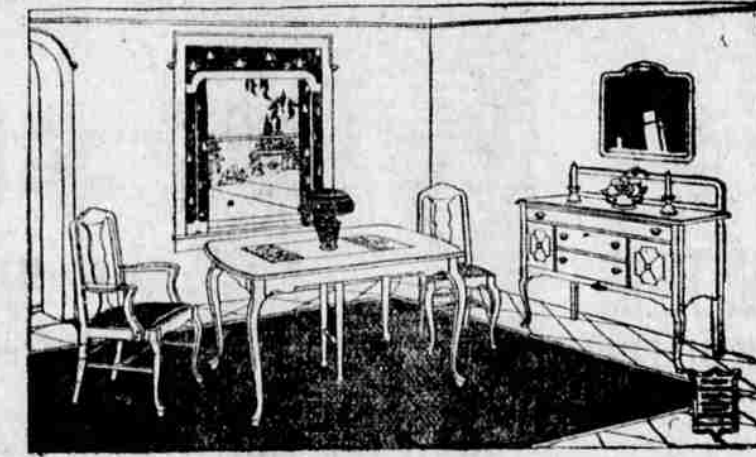

JERUSALEM (AP)—The scourge of malaria is gradually but surely being subdued in Palestine, according to an official government report making public the proceedings of a recent meeting of the anti-malarial advisory commission. Colonel Heron, director of health of the Palestine government, presided.

It was stated that there had been less malaria throughout Palestine in 1923 than in any previous year, and that no where did it appear in epidemic form. This was due to some extent to the small rainfall during the pre-
