Beauty Hints

Hot Shovels, Wine, and Myrrh Required in Old Beauty Recipes.
Nowadays when milady wishes to apply a cleansing cream, astringent, hair tonic, or other beauty lotion, she merely opens a shiny little bottle or jar where the preparation is all ready for use.

Not so with the woman of even a few centuries ago. When she wished a beauty treatment she had to assemble half a dozen ingredients, mix them carefully according to formula, perhaps even cook them. Consider the difference.

In the method of applying them. Compare the relative comfort between sitting in an easy chair in your boudoir patting on an astringent and going through the inquisition process described in this ancient astringent recipe, supposed to tone up the skin and remove crow's feet:

"First a shovel of hot, and on it throw a pinch of powdered Myrrh, meantime throwing a thick towel over the head and bending over the shovel to get the fumes directly upon the face. Repeat this three times, then heat the shovel a fourth time and spray on a little white wine. Let the fumes penetrate, and repeat the procedure three times."

It is obvious that this recipe was in vogue in the days when white wine was more available than it is today!

A popular hair ointment of 1488 A. D. was made by the following recipe: "Mix salt-marine, vitriol, and nitrate of potassium; grind together with dried roots of scab-wort, all of popples, bile of an ox, a very little soap, Araby gum, alum, sulphur and ginger. Rub the hair with this preparation and

leave till morning."

Another "hair raising" recipe of olden times reads: "Take dried calms from the Orient, grind them to powder and mix them in equal proportions with the yolks of eggs that have been boiled; then mix with wild honey. COLLEGE NEAR OPENING DAY

EUGENE, Ore. (Special).—With six days remaining before freshmen report for the fall term at the University of Oregon, university officials have prepared final instructions to the first-year students which will be mailed to each accepted applicant for matriculation early this week. Physical examinations for entering students are scheduled for Sept. 23, and on the following day the freshmen will report for the English examination.

Complete registration material will be released to these students, Sept. 24, and on the two days following the freshmen will meet with their faculty advisers when their academic schedules will be prepared. University classes begin on Monday, September 23.

The university will have an increased enrollment this year over last. Since 1919 the increase has been steady, and the number of first-year students whose applications have been accepted to do indicate that the institution will record another advance this year.

Registrar Carlton E. Spencer has prepared detailed instructions for the new students which will reach them by mail before they leave their homes for the campus. They are informed that they may take their English examination either at 9 a. m. or 1 p. m. in Villard hall, Sept. 22. Each student is told he must choose a major department on registration day. The head of the major department, or a staff member designated by him, will act as the student's advisor.

The residence halls will be open on the evening of Sept. 21. No applications for rooms in the halls will be received after Sept. 22. Lists of approved rooming and boarding places in Eugene are in the hands of Mrs. Virginia Judy Estery, dean of women, and the Y. M. C. A. The Y. M. C. A. has made a survey of the employment situation in Eugene and is now in the process of making a list of students who are partially or wholly self-supporting.
