COMMISSION MEET QUIET

The regular weekly meeting of the commission last evening was principally devoted to regular routine business. The meeting came to order at 7:30 o'clock with commissioners H. S. Brown and C. J. Black present.

The principal part of the evening was taken up by the reading and passing of financial statements on improvement districts number 127, 129, 130 and 132. District number 132 was assessed to the amount of \$27,412.21, number 129, \$23,324.93, number 127 to the amount of \$53,499.74 and number 128, \$62,569.45.

A motion was passed by the commission to draw up a warrant for the payment to the Security Construction company of \$1,267 for hauling gravel on Jackson avenue. A petition from P. J. Lilly was granted an order for the payment of \$7,125.94 less ten per cent was given.

A petition by property owners to open up Cedar street between K and M avenues was read, approved and the city manager given orders to proceed with the work of opening the street and putting in condition for traffic.

MEMORY USED IN INVENTORY

Charles W. Hamley, the memory expert who is to speak in the La Grande high school auditorium Monday evening at 7:50 o'clock, not only is a Yakima Indian, but he was at one time handicapped with ordinary memory. He studied mnemonics during spare time in Seattle, Wash., when he was connected with the fire department, and he claims many difficult feats.

While overcast with the A. B. C. Hamley inventoried without pencil or paper, carried code messages "in his head" and has since performed many difficult and astonishing feats, he claims. For him a wide reputation as one of the greatest of memory experts and has been in great demand in the western states especially both as an entertainer and as a lecturer.

America Found Before 1362, Stone Indicates

Maria! Save us! from evil!
(We) have ten of our party by the sea to look after (or for) our vessels 14 days' journey from this island. Year 1362.
The ten men mentioned in the text are supposed to have been members of the exploration party left to watch the ship while the rest went fishing, as stated.
In theory, the story of the exploration party's presence in America is that an expedition was fitted out in Norway in 1254 by Paul Knutson in relief of colonists in Greenland. It is believed that Knutson eventually reached Vinland and, not finding those of whom he came in search, journeyed on to what is now the Hudson Bay country. The time of the expedition fits in with the date inscribed on the Rune Stone.
The word "Ave Maria" of the text indicates the presence of a

Catholic priest in the expedition, Mr. Holand says.
Very little is known of the Knutson expedition or of its return, but it is known that the men included in its personnel were a long time absent.
A further theory is that the "lost colonists," described by the explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson as having been found by him west of Hudson Bay in 1909, may have been descendants of the "lost colonists." In search of which Knutson went.

began. He feels that in them he is getting actual first-hand information.
And as his speech and his invitation for letters were broadcast through a dozen stations, blanketing the country as far west as the Rockies, he feels the replies he is receiving are geographically as well as politically representative.
It was largely as a result of the optimism inspired by the response to his radio speech that "Fighting Bob," in an address to Independent workers in Washington September 8, declared he now has "an even break with President Coolidge for the election."
All the bugs that visit the White House are not political bugs. Apparently President Coolidge for the period of the campaign, at least, can tolerate the latter sort but he has declared war on the cock-roaches, water bugs and kindred insects which infest the White House and crannies of the century-old executive mansion, and a professional "bug-hunter" has recently been employed to wage war upon them.
Latent reports are that the bug are fighting a losing battle. After one night's barrage of bug powder carpenter ants tore out an old ice box in the White House basement. Behind it they found nearly five pounds of dead insects.
The White House, however, is not Washington's only choice retreat for bugs.
All the older government buildings, with their thick walls and cool, shaded cracks and corridors filled with money flies and dusty shelves, invite the presence of myriads of bugs, particularly roaches, which develop an unbelievable size and bravado.

The evacuation is part of Sun's plan to concentrate his forces at Shuechow in north Quango in support of Chekiang's war against Kiamen and the central government at Peking, is dividing his forces between Canton and Shuechow, supporting the concentration. Sun, former mayor of Canton, is proceeding to Mukden to confer with General Chang Tso-lin of Manchuria with whom Sun has allied himself in the war against the Peking government.

He was in La Grande with the basketball team in 1912, playing two games. He also coached football in Charleston, S. C., putting the military school, The Citadel, victors over the state university.
Missionary to Korea.
He was a missionary to Korea, having returned to America on account of Mrs. Powell's health. He spent a year and nine months in the war as a Y. M. C. A. secretary in the capacity as his religious work secretary, assistant camp secretary and lecturer. He was four and one-half months in Great Britain and five and one-half in France, and was with the 13th Infantry of the 23rd division that assisted the British launch the drive against the Germans that began their flight out of Belgium.

IRISH PEOPLE TOLD BY PRESS TO STAY HOME

DUBLIN (AP)—There are urgent appeals in the Dublin press against the renewal of emigration to America. The Independent says: "We were frequently assured in the past that had Ireland control of her own affairs emigration would cease. But though the British have departed the country is still being drained of its young men and women."
In the past two months the American consuls has received 8,000 applications for emigration visas, and the Free State quota soon will be exhausted. The applicants are mostly from the country districts.
Judge Colahan of New York, who has lately been in Ireland, has advised young Irish men and women to seek a career in their own country rather than go to the United States or Canada.
It is pointed out that large numbers of skilled British artisans failing to get employment in America, are returning to Great Britain in a steady stream, and that the prospects for Irish unskilled laborers are extremely unfavorable.

MEMOIR USED IN INVENTORY

Reverend Powell had held pastorates in southwest Missouri until appointed a missionary to Korea. On returning to the United States he became pastor of Spring Street church, Charleston, S. C., and spent about three years in that state until entering the war work. He was demobilized at Vancouver, Wash., and became a pastor at Corvallis and then had a pulpit in Walla Walla for four years. He was offered \$25,000 and traveling expenses to return to the Spring Street church in Charleston which is the second largest of four churches of its denomination in Charleston having a membership of about 600.

Shantung Villagers Are for Education

TEKOW, Shantung (AP)—An unprecedented desire for education for girls is being shown throughout the western districts of Shantung. For perhaps the last ten years there have been government girls' schools in a few of the cities of this region, but they have not been popular and the enrollments have not been large.
Of late a distinct change has taken place. The villagers are clamoring for schools and particularly for schools to impart western learning—geography, arithmetic, drawing, athletics and other branches hitherto not considered desirable for Chinese pupils and especially for girls.
A feature of the movement is a certain social service phase which it has assumed. Many girls who have been in school during the winter go to their homes for the summer and open schools for less fortunate girls. Boys too are working along the same line and in some instances where unable to get enough boy pupils they have admitted girls. Thus co-education is being introduced, an unheard-of mark of progress in these interior places.

Mexico Would Save Its Children

MEXICO CITY (AP)—More than 50 percent of the children born in Mexico never reach their first birthday, the federal department of health has announced in a bulletin with which it opened a child-saving campaign. "Thousands of these little ones die because of improper alimentation," the department asserts.
