TSINGTAO, Shantung, China. (AP)—The execution here a few days ago of four pirates attracted a crowd estimated at 5,000 persons. It emphasized the lawlessness which is a recognized trait in Chinese psychology. The day was converted into a festival. Peanut, candy and soft drink vendors along the route to and from the field where the execution occurred did a thriving business. An immense throng formed a sort of triumphal procession behind the doomed men as they trudged to their death, and looked on wide-eyed at the spectacle of the shooting.

Logging Company Makes Repairs
McMINNVILLE, Ore. — Workmen of the Eliza Logging company were busy this week repairing damage done to company's holdings west of Carlton by the fire which burned from Wednesday until Monday night, when it was finally brought under control. Equipment damaged included 12 donkey engines, of which all can be repaired except one, on which a tree fell. About a mile of roadway, including three trestles was burned over. The fire burned over about two square miles of logged-off land, doing no damage to standing timber.

FORDS RETURN FROM JOURNEY

Local People Tell of Trip Through California Including Catalina Island

Mr. and Mrs. B. Ford have returned from a tour of California where they visited Mr. Ford's father, who is one of the large road contractors of southern California, having built many of the highways in the southern part of the state.

While en route they stopped at Santa Rosa and Ed took a deer hunt with a party that bagged six nice bucks in two and one-half days. "The deer are much smaller than our natives and we were allowed to use dogs in hunting them," he relates. "While in this neighborhood we also visited Bodoga bay, one of the pleasure resorts, and had a great time surf fishing. This is great sport. You pull off your shoes, take a large net on the end of a pole, and when the waves come in you run out into them and dip your net and catch the surf fish which resemble our smelt. While here we saw a 75-ton whale that had been washed ashore."

While in San Francisco Mr. and Mrs. Ford met a number of La Grander. Mrs. Olive Ray, Roy K. Stanfield and the Lewin boys who own a drug store there, being among them.

In Los Angeles they visited Universal City and saw Harry Carey and a number of stars making pictures. "Many people have the impression that Hollywood is a small place with a fence around it where the movie people run wild," Mr. Ford states, "but such is not the case. Hollywood is a city of about 100,000 inhabitants and you never see any of the movie folk unless you happen to run into them on the street or at the studio and you can hardly tell when you get into Hollywood going from Los Angeles."

Visited Catalina Isle
They visited Catalina Island, one of the most celebrated resorts of the world and also the home of Wm. Wrigley, Jr., the gum king. Catalina Island is about 25 miles off Los Angeles harbor and has an area of 43,428 square miles, an average width of three miles and is 27 miles long. It acquires considerable of its fame from the fact that it is a year round resort.

Adjacent to the island are the beautiful submarine gardens which are viewed from the famous glass bottom boats. Three months in the year flying fish come there to spawn and Mr. and Mrs. Ford happened to be lucky enough to see them when they were on hand and took what is called a searchlight trip to see them. A large searchlight is trained on the water from a fast motor boat that cruises the bay at night and one can see the flying fish as they jump out of the water and glide for a distance of from six feet to 200 yards. In size and color they resemble fresh water mackerel having two thin fish fins in front which carry them through the air at great speed.

Saw Viola Dana
While at Catalina Island we saw Viola Dana and Ray Griffith on location for Paramount filming the picture "Lord Chumley," he related. "Many of the large productions are made there on the island." "While en route we met a number of Oregonians who always gave us the glad hand. In Catalina Grove we saw one of the old timers of La Grande—Mr. Messner, who wanted to be remembered to his friends. Another old timer was Andrew Lunn, whom many will remember."

Sentenced to Hang

KANSAS CITY (By the Associated Press)—Five thousand Klansmen, representing the various realms, provinces and klantons in the United States, will convene in Kansas City, Sept. 23, 24 and 25 for the second Imperial Klonyokation of the Ku Klux Klan, according to a statement issued here by George C. McCarron, Imperial representative of the knights of the Klan.

"There will be no parade or demonstration of any kind staged in connection with the klonyokation," says Mr. McCarron's statement. "It convenes for the sole purpose of handling the official business of the organization."

The klonyokation is the sole legislative body of the order, according to Mr. McCarron, and meets biennially to transact the business of the organization.
