applying whatever was the Carthaginian equivalent of the Maudslowe range of today before casting herself upon the burning pyre.

Some writers have advanced the theory that a contributing factor to the fall of Carthage was the extensive use of cosmetics at that time. solution to the puzzle that has been bothering the political managers of all the parties, which puzzle is: "How can we stir the interest of the women voters?"

All of the parties, of course, have "Women's Bureaus," with women in charge, trying to stir up some semblance of enthusiasm among the women. But although the women were fighting tooth and toenail a few years ago for the ballot, now that they've got it they're seemingly trying to conserve it as a sort of souvenir instead of using it, the candidates complain.

This is particularly true of the very organizations that were in the thick of the fight for equal suffrage. The National Women's Party and the National League of Women Voters, for instance, are both standing on the sidelines, declining to be enticed into any of the rival political camps.

Official and influential members of these organizations say they must not side either with Republicans or Independents lest their action be misconstrued. Since their organizations are non-partisan, they must be non-committal.

A concentrated campaign to crack this reserve on the part of women's organizations is under way by the women's bureaus of all three political outfits.

So far as winning an open endorsement for any candidate, however, by any of the national women's suffrage organizations, the outlook is altogether bleak. There will be no effort, on the part of any of them, to "deliver" the women's vote. Probably they know they couldn't deliver, even if they promised. So they decline to raise any false hopes.

It is the individual women, not the organizations of women, that will decide where the women's vote will land.

And, understanding feminine psychology better than the masculine campaigners, it is the vote of individual women Mrs. La Follette and Mrs. Wheeler will invite from the stump.

COW TESTING IS IN FAVOR

Testing cows for butterfat production in order to weed out the low producers is gaining headway in eastern Oregon counties, says N. C. Jamison, dairy specialist for the U. S. extension service, who directs cow testing association work in the state.

In Deschutes county 19 dairymen owning 211 cows have entered into an agreement with W. T. McDonald, county agent, and the Smith-Hughes teacher in the Redmond high school whereby they will weigh the milk from these cows, take representative samples once a month, and deliver them to the fester at designated time and place. A report of feed consumed and labor performed will also be prepared by them. Tests of the individual cows with the feed and labor records will be forwarded to Mr. Jamison and included in the monthly summary of cow testing association work. Each cooperating dairyman will be supplied with a county summary. A similar plan is to be put into operation soon in Union county with 150 cows on test, says H. G. Avery, county agent. Umatilla county also plans to carry on cow testing work. County agents in Klamath and Lake counties are conducting testing in a small way.

About 4000 Oregon cows are now in cow testing associations. More than 3000 of them are in Tillamook county, where this work has been carried on without a break for more than 10 years. The average fat production per cow in that county is 232 pounds per year as compared with an average of about 145 pounds for the state as a whole. The 1923-1924 report of the Tillamook cow testing association number one showed that the 1184 cows in that association averaged 347 pounds fat.

fifty-one of the 61 herds made an average of more than 300 pounds. The state agricultural economic conference said that keeping systematic records is a most effective means of increasing average production per cow and that this can best be done through cow testing associations.

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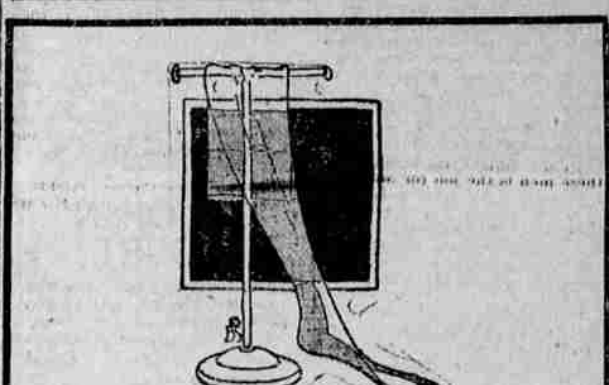
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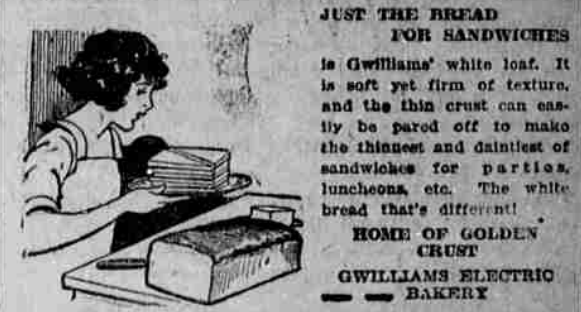
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
