"We have built some planes," said Lieut. Erik Nelson, engineering officer of the world flight, as he jumped from the New Orleans and quickly found the airplane maker on the field and hugged him.

Two Mothers Greet Sons.—Fond mothers' greetings were bestowed upon two of the flyers, Lieutenant Smith and Lieut. John Harding, by Mrs. Jasper Smith of Los Angeles and Mrs. Barbara Chase Harding of Beverly Hills.

The world cruises, mechanically perfect, hummed their way up from San Diego against headwinds following the coast line most of the time. They flew over Los Angeles, then turned down to the field by the seashore, landing in 1 hour and 20 minutes after they hopped off from Rockwell, San Diego.

The flight will be resumed Thursday forenoon, the time of departure depending upon reports of weather conditions by scout planes, which will leave the field here at 7 o'clock in the morning. Maj. Shepherd Fitzgerald, who will pilot one of the scout planes, said that the route would be up the valley, across Tehachap pass then over Inland Empire, Fresno and other valley towns, and then over Livermore pass and to the San Francisco Bay region.

The flight to San Francisco will take about four and a half hours.

COLLEGE FAIR EXHIBIT POINTS WAY TO HEALTH

A spectacular engineering display, a plant hospital and "Healthland" are some of the features of the O. A. C. exhibits which are drawing large numbers of spectators at the state fair at Salem this week. Two separate divisions are made of the display put on by the college. The Oregon experiment station exhibit is in the auditorium section of the educational pavilion showing the work carried on in the 10 divisions of agriculture at the home station and results being obtained at several of the seven branch stations in the state. In the north wing of the same pavilion is shown the resident instructional work and that of the extension service.

A demonstration which produces highly spectacular electrical effects shows the method used in the fixation of atmospheric nitrogen by the artificial process. This is the system brought into use during the great war when foreign supplies were cut off and is the process in use at Mische Rhodius, or which Henry Ford is trying to get control. "Healthland," through which the "Healthland flyer" makes along the railroad include "Hath-tubville," "Orange Meadows," "Baked Potato Hill," "Spinach Green," "Hot Soup Springs" and others designed to illustrate various features of the healthful life.

A plant hospital through which sick plants of various kinds are shown, showing their weary way is one of the most spectacular of the exhibits put on by the experiment station. The receiving ward, corresponding to the free service given farmers in determining the nature of plant troubles, is shown, followed by dispensary, surgery, surgery ward, dust ward, bath ward, physiological ward and even a criminal ward. In addition the hospital contains a library and a research laboratory.

Relationships Complicated—My Father and Son. Weddings. MEXICO (AP)—The recent wedding of Karl Braun, 25 years old, and his father have started an endless chain of relationships which has got beyond the reach of genealogists and culminated in Braun becoming his father's father-in-law.

Young Braun married a widow of 45 with grown-up children. Shortly after his father, 50 years of age, married the 24-year-old daughter of his son's wife. Genealogists figure that as a result of the two weddings young Braun became his father's father-in-law, and that his wife's daughter became her mother's mother-in-law and the step-mother of her own step-father.

Japan Soon Will Enjoy Ten-Acre Athletic Field—TOKIO (AP)—A national athletic field, designed as headquarters for the growing development of western athletics in Japan, will be opened this autumn in the outer precincts of the Meiji shrine.

The field will cover ten acres, will include a stadium of 25 tiers and will be the largest such establishment in the Far East. It is estimated that all its various athletic grounds, if filled with spectators at one time, would hold 240,000 persons. The stadium will cover both and dressing rooms, with dining and sleeping rooms for athletes.

It is planned to open the new field with a national track and field meet November 3.

Palestine Long on Holidays. JERUSALEM (AP)—Friday, Saturdays and Sundays, the Sabbath, or the three faiths in Palestine, are recognized as official holidays for purposes of presentation of negotiable paper, and no proceedings on those days, according to a decision of a conference of merchants with the Chief Justice. All other official holidays of Moslems, Jews and Christians are similarly recognized in Palestine.

DAYTON SEEKS AIR PRESTIGE

DAYTON, O. (AP)—Twenty years ago Orville and Wilbur Wright, proprietors of a small mechanical shop took a strange looking contraption some nine miles out of town and made their first public airplane flight.

On October 2, 3 and 4, Orville Wright will journey out to that same piece of land, it now is a part of Wilbur Wright field, and watch the invention which he and his brother gave to the world, hurtle through the air at speeds which, if anyone had even dared to think of 20 years ago, would have brought more derision than the crude affair of canvas and wire it is.

McCook field, the experimental station of the American Army Air Service, is located on the edge of town. Nine miles out is Wilbur Wright field. The government either leases, or owns outright, 200 acres at Wright field, but the field itself now consists of 5,000 acres, 5,000 of which recently were given

to the government by Dayton, the money for the purpose of the land being furnished by citizens.

The land has been accepted by the government, and it is the dream of Dayton some day to see the field the greatest air center in the world. The Dayton plan is eventually to combine the two fields into one vast plant, which would be a memorial to Wilbur Wright.

McCook field will be open to all spectators during the meet, and there will be an exhibition glider and a number of the air, as well as strange mechanical contrivances that fly. The Army Air Service helicopter, one of the most recent developments, will be one of the unusual sights.

The Harling Bomber, the world's largest airplane, may be an exhibition, and it is expected that the Shenandoah will be brought out. For contrast to these levitations, one of the original type Wright planes is being reconditioned and probably will be piloted in a flight by Lieut. John A. Macfready.

German Garages Lack Elements of Efficiency.—BERLIN (AP)—An effort is under way to revise the operation of public garages in Germany, and bring into effect some of the efficiency that prevails in this regard in the United States.

Under the German building laws, not more than three automobiles may be stored in one room. To overcome this handicap, garage owners built box stalls for each car, and divided a large room into many small ones. But the time lost in handling cars in and out of these cells, and the waste of room and fuel are great deterrents, and an effort will be made to amend the law.
