Adversity A Spur

Are you up against it? Don't worry. It's up against you.

Eight years ago Alfred Floegel arrived in New York from Leipzig unable to speak English and without money or prospects. But he had himself and a will to work. And work he did, as house painter, stucco worker, ship's painter and kalsominer. As much time as he could he spent in his "squalid little studio," for his ambition was to be an artist, not an artisan. So it is announced that he has won the Prix de Rome, which entitles him to a three years' residency in the Academy of Arts and to an income of \$2,000 a year.

Floegel was up against it, many times. But it was up against him.

Adversity seldom keeps a good man down. For adversity makes him work the harder and the harder he works the more the good that is in him is made strong and dominant.

They say that when nations become rich and powerful they turn the arts and win fame in them. That is largely true, for a young nation, hewing its way in the wilderness, has little time for the cultivation of life's finer side. So, it is predicted, America is about to achieve signal glory in the realm of painting and sculpture and poetry and music, as her vast resources give her leisure for the encouragement of those pursuits. That is gratifying. But this must be said, that they who will win fame for America in the arts will be—as were those who won immortality for Italy and Greece—chiefly those who must fight their way.

Nations turn to the arts in the day of their prosperity, but their fame is won by men who battle with adversity.

Less Poverty

Government statistics were unnecessary to show that poverty is rapidly decreasing in the United States. For a dozen years it has been apparent and the government now proves it on paper showing there are 78,000 persons in the almshouses of the country this year compared with 84,000 in 1910.

In a nation of 112,000,000 people it is quite remarkable that only 78,000 are in the poorhouse. It is more remarkable when it is known that the poorhouses of this country are only open to those mentally or physically unfit to be self-supporting. The inmates of the almshouses are not where they are because they are too shiftless to work. They can't work.

What a contrast this nation provides with the others of the world. Throughout Europe the poorhouses, where they have them, are full to overflowing and millions more people are receiving unemployment pensions. England has a large almshouse population. Everywhere in Europe and Asia poverty is said to be increasing. Of course Africa, South America, Central America and the Orient have their history—old condition of poverty under which the lower classes, numbering into the millions of people, are periodically in need of government sustenance.

There are several explanations for the decline of poverty, and public-dependence in this country. First among them is that the American people are opposed to paternalism. Able-bodied men and women who do not work do not eat in the United States, unless they steal. Secondly, there is inculcated into the American people the desire to work and the ambition to be independent. Another is that the idler is abhorred by society.

There is no revolution in Chile, we are told. All that happened is that its president has put on a suit and taken a six months' vacation.

ADVERTISING SCOPE WIDE

Fifty million persons a month
were reached during the last year
by the Pacific Northwest adver-
tising campaign conducted by the
Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, the
Great Northern and the Northern
Pacific railroads, according to a
booklet received here containing 15
copies of the advertisement and
an explanation of the scope of
the campaign. The campaign
has been conducted with adver-
tisements in ten national magazines
in addition a series of booklets
were printed and distributed across
more complete information about
the Pacific Northwest than was
possible in the space of the adver-
tisements. A half million copies of
these also were distributed.

The publicity campaign, said

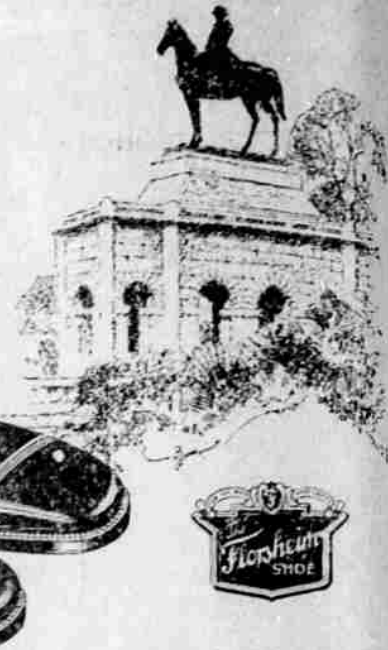
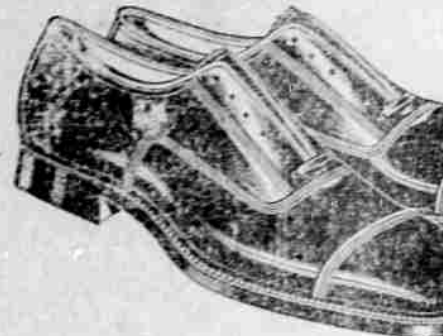
