came he has personal interests which demand his attention, to accept another appointment, as to the Supreme Court, or to run for the Senate, for instance. But a cabinet dismissal, or what amounts to one, is no favorable advertisement for any administration.

But a president who is re-elected may reorganize his cabinet without in the least embarrassing himself

politically. And that, politicians are betting, is what Coolidge will do, and do drastically, if he gets in again.

The president, as all know, took over the official family Harding left to him. He couldn't very well make changes in it and carry out his announced intention of continuing his predecessor's policies, which it seemed to be good politics for him to profess to stick to.

However, it's no secret that Coolidge has ideas quite different from Harding's. That was proved conclusively by the thoroughness with which the Republicans' old managing group was cleaned out, directly after Coolidge's nomination at Cleveland, in favor of the present new managing group.

That was the psychological moment for changing party management.

Next March will be the psychological moment for changing cabinets—if Coolidge is re-elected. Attorney General Stone and Secretary of the Navy Wilbur were Coolidge selections. The former assuming a continuation of the Coolidge regime—may stay on. If any of the other cabinet members do, it will surprise Washington.

REBUILDING PLANS LAID

BEND, Ore. — Sisters, half destroyed by a fire last week, probably will be rebuilt before the beginning of the 1925 tourist season, according to persons in Bend from that town.

Several modern buildings, instead of a group of cheap structures, will replace the ones destroyed in the fire. It is predicted by the residents of Sisters, who point out that several of the buildings burned in the two fires were not occupied in recent years.

JUDGE KELLY UNOPPOSED

SALEM, Ore.—Judge Percy Kelly of Albany will be the only candidate for justice of the state supreme court to succeed the late Justice John McCourt at the November election. This was announced by the secretary of state here when the time for filing for the November election expired.

Judge Kelly will appear on the ballot as an independent candidate. As Governor Pierce has not yet appointed a successor to Justice McCourt, the man whom he names for the berth cannot become a candidate at the November election.

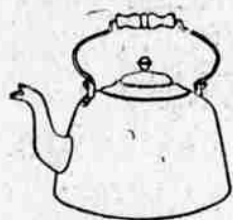

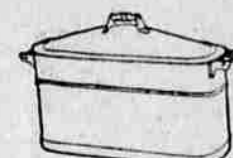

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ENTIRE STATE IS INVITED

EUGENE, Ore. — Mayor Parks sent telegrams to the mayors of all cities in the valley inviting their citizens to be present when the world flyers land at the municipal aviation field here. The mayor earlier in the week sent personal letters to the mayors of cities farther away, such as Pendleton, Baker, La Grande, The Dalles, Hood River, Astoria, Klamath Falls, Marshfield, North Bend, Medford and Ashland, containing the same invitation.

The mayor received a telegram from Major-General U. G. Morton at the presidio, San Francisco, requesting him to afford the airplanes and the personnel of the flying squad all protection possible, and the mayor replied that two companies of state troops, besides policemen on horseback and motorcycles and on foot, would be provided.

It is expected that the planes will arrive here in the middle of the afternoon if weather conditions do not cause them to postpone their flight from San Francisco. While the surface of the ground at the aviation field is somewhat soft because of the heavy rains, it was said that it was not too soft for a successful landing of the giant planes.

THREE HEARINGS SCHEDULED

SALEM, Ore.—Members of the public service commission will go to Marshfield October 2 for a public hearing on the application of the Stout Lumber company for permission to construct a spur railroad track.

October 3 the commission will be at Gardiner and Redport. At Gardiner a hearing will be held on water facilities. The Redport hearing will have to do with the application of the Winchester Bay Lumber company for permission to establish a grade crossing.
