This cup is to be perpetual and will be the property of the club but will be contested for every year.

The tournament will be in match play, playing for each hole. With the handicaps arranged so as to last through the entire tournament it would be an impossibility to even conjecture as to the probable winner of the event for the reason that everyone has a good chance. Match play gives the club an opportunity to take his handicap and win a hole or more out of 18 holes and thus win the match.

The difference between the players' handicaps will be the total number of strokes allowed the higher handicap men. For instance a golfer with a handicap of 14 playing one with a handicap of 25 will have 14 strokes against him when the match starts.

Lowers will be matched in beaten flights of 12 and the winners of each flight will have their name engraved on the cup also.

Time Limit Given.
All matches in the first flight must be played by October second, being an elimination tournament the winner of match number one will be played in the next flight with the winner of match number two. Thus each man can tell who he will play next as soon as the returns from the matches are turned in.

of our county constantly before our own people and the great flood of tourists that travel east and west over our magnificent highway, the old Oregon Trail.

Let us build at some vantage point, near a town where lights, sewerage and water are available, a great and substantial county pavilion wherein space can be given to each community for literature and exhibits that will typify the resources of each section of the county and which can be varied as the crops of the different seasons change.

In this way every community would have a fair chance for publicity. The excellent exhibits that would be on display would breed a faith of our own people in our country, and attract the attention of more tourists and home seekers than could be done in any other way.

This pavilion could be provided with an auditorium, moving pictures, and lantern slides to better show the attractions of our own sections, and the great northwest. There should be committee rooms and facilities for holding county gatherings, such as our Economic Conference. It should be surrounded by a well-equipped tour-

last camp ground, maintained by the county.

COOLIDGE URGES FULL RESISTANCE

people resist encroachment upon their rights and liberties guaranteed by the constitution.

"If we wish to maintain what our fathers here established," he declared, "we must do well to leave the people in the ownership of their government and under the protection of their courts."

It is difficult, the president said, referring to government ownership of railroads, "to reconcile the American ideal of a sovereign people capable of owning and managing their own government with an inability to own and manage their own business."

Means More Taxes.
Furthermore, he declared, it would mean a loss in public revenue estimated at \$600,000,000 a year with a resultant increase in the tax on farmers of from 3 to 10 per cent.

Mr. Coolidge devoted most of his address to a discussion of early history of this country, and the birth of the constitution after the organization of the first continental congress.

Referring to the deliberations of this congress, the president asserted that "if we could better understand what they said and did to establish our free institutions, we should be less likely to be misled by the misrepresentations and distorted arguments of the hour and be far better equipped to maintain them."

He drew a lesson from the declaration of the congress as showing the "superiority of moderation and candor over violence and deceit in seeking a solution of difficult public questions."

The constitution, Mr. Coolidge pointed out, "is a device for maintaining in perpetuity the rights of the people, with the ultimate extinction of all privileged classes."

Historic Scenes Are Re-created.
PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Representatives of the 12 original states joined with citizens of Philadelphia Thursday in celebrating the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the signing of the first constitutional congress and the two hundredth anniversary of the founding of the Carpenter's company, in whose historic hall the congress met, Thursday night.

During the day Carpenter's hall was the center of ceremonies in honor of the two memorable events in American history. Regimental bands in dress uniforms of the day, historic military commands of some of the original 12 colonies marched past the structure in a parade down Chestnut street.

departments contain many beautiful and useful articles, ranging from crocheted bed spreads to luncheon sets and from preserves to cakes that would make the mouth of the most fastidious epicure water with anticipation at viewing them.

A goodly number of the entries were judged yesterday but the first list has not yet been prepared for publication. It will be printed later.

Ducks Are Beauties.
In the poultry display, in addition to numbers of chickens from Pymouth brook to Wyandottes and from White Leghorns to Bantams, ducks, turkeys, geese and even an ostrich are on exhibition.

The most striking display, in a side a pen of Mallard ducks and

drakes that would make a hit with any of the fanciers who cater to the demand for feathers and utility at the same time.

In the same tent some guinea pigs and rabbits are also shown. The livestock horses are well filled with animals of all types and breeds that are practically all of high quality. Thoroughbred horses, pure bred cows, real "cowboys" and other sorts are all to be viewed.

The second day racing program was better than Wednesday, and though the track was wet from the morning rain, some fair time was made. Showers hit the arena a couple of times during the afternoon but both were passing and did not impede the progress of the events.

In the saddle horse race Dick Hubbard came in first and in the following quarter mile dash Mrs. Jordan flashed under the wire in 24 seconds flat. One of the most interesting races of the day, due perhaps to the game up-and-down that nearly resulted in victory by one of the contenders, was the half mile Indian race. One of the boys got off to a 20 or 40 yard disadvantage but passed all but the leader and came in a fairly close second.

Other races resulted as follows: Ladies' race, Mrs. Jordan; mile race, Jessie Farrow; novelty race, Clarence Halliday; three-eighths mile dash, Jessie Farrow; five-eighths mile race, Fred Reed; Joe Cantrell's horse (Fred) was winner by only a few inches margin; half mile saddle horse race, Fred Reed; men's relay, Jessie Farrow won riding Jim White; steeple, of Pendleton, with Kenneth Kennedy coming in second, riding Joe Sommers' horses. White won behind the first two laps and most of the last but in the final sprint, slipped past Kennedy.

In addition to the racing, bucking, roping and throwing, and team pulling contests were staged. Floyd Ireland, of Wallawa county, gave an exhibition of holding two horses, both pulling in opposite directions.

In the bucking, Lute Geiger made one of the best rides of the day. One cowboy nearly calked Hubbard on his hands gripping the saddle horn and the others found it fairly easy to stick on.

In the evening Wild Cat Gutch, as usual, found a large crowd participating in the fun.

La Grande People Present.
Yesterday was La Grande day and although the Legion Band and Drum Corps were unable to come, a number of Trailmen from the La Grande chamber of commerce were present.

Several Wallawa "savages" brought the Wallawa County Fair to hold next week, were also in attendance.

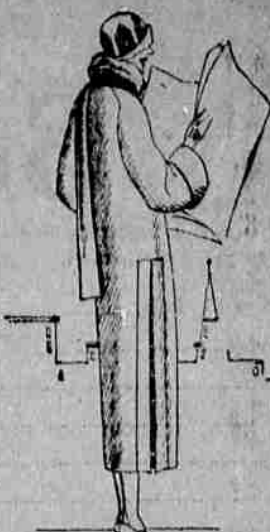
Lieut. Wade, having installed his new battery, reached Crater field at 3:02 p. m.
