DEL MONTE HOTEL GOES UP IN SMOKE

blamed for the fire.

DEL MONTE, Cal. (By the Associated Press.) The Hotel Del Monte, the center of a play ground internationally known to tourists, was destroyed by fire of undetermined origin which started in a tower in the front part of the building at 2:30 o'clock this morning and continued to burn until day break.

The fire cost 600 guests scrambling to get out of the building, the destruction of the main structure, valued at a million dollars. Monterey and Pacific Grove fire departments combined in efforts to save the east and west wings of the building and resorted to dynamite, but the fire continued to move into the upburned portions of the building and at daylight, little hope was held out for saving any part of the structure.

Art Treasures Saved.

Art treasures valued at \$75,000 were saved by townspeople. A special train is to take the 600 guests to San Francisco for accommodations.

To Rebuild.

The hotel management has announced plans to build a class A structure to replace the hotel.

FOOT, MOUTH DISEASE IN TEXAS HERD

ways necessary since scarcely three-fourths of the animals can be found the first time.

The inspection forces have been working the region from six camps and one or more inspectors have made careful examinations of stock at all the round-ups. Country to inspection, based on a knowledge that infection formerly existed on the range, none of the stock has shown signs of foot and mouth disease.

After October 1, when the ranges have been freed as fully as possible from domestic livestock and wild life, the inspectors will gather up or shoot all stray and wild animals, thereby preventing the possibility of the disease spreading to other regions.

In other portions of the state where infection formerly existed all reports show evidence that methods of eradication were 100 per cent effective. More than 300 premises have either been restocked entirely or in part through the admission of test animals without showing any signs of the plague. Restocking measures formerly in effect at stockyards and hearing on feeding operations are being relaxed and removed. This action has enabled managers of extensive livestock-feeding corporations in California to resume or extend their activities.

The Department of Agriculture has withdrawn practically all quarantines formerly imposed, except those governing small areas most of which were formerly infected premises, on which the necessary tests are still in progress. Stockmen have occasionally reported to Federal inspectors the presence of animals showing symptoms somewhat similar to foot and mouth disease, but all cases investigated have proved to be non-infectious disorders. State officials of California, including those of the State Department of Agriculture and of the California Fish and Game Commission, continue to co-operate with Federal authorities in taking the final measures that will complete the work on this outbreak.

Upper Reaches of Amazon Draw Amazon Explorer

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Dr. M. W. Stirling, D. has been heard here, is about to start on a trip to South America, where he will spend several months in the Amazon, taking photographs of the life and customs of the local Indian tribes.

Dr. Stirling, who was formerly attached to the Smithsonian Institution, excavated a number of Indian mounds near St. Petersburg early this year. As a result of these labors he was able to reconstruct the discovery of new methods of Indian burial, and various interesting finds of pottery.

Fallotte 19,829, and Davis 2,068. Most Republican political propaganda have placed California in the certain column for Coolidge, and founded their computations on a total electoral vote in which the Pacific state's 12 ballots were included.

"California, it is recalled, upset one election, not long since, and from present indications, the state is far from firmly planted in the republican column."

"The drift of votes, shown in a general way by a tabulation of how the Same Voters Voted in 1920," seems to suggest a loss of Republican strength to La Follette in California, a much smaller loss in Illinois, Pennsylvania, and New York. Analyzing the vote in more detail, it appears from the markings of the ballots that, at Mr. Coolidge's 22,843 votes from California, 16,976 of the voters were Republicans in the last elections, 1,431 were Democrats, and 4,364 either cast no vote or neglected to declare their previous affiliation.

"Or Mr. La Follette's vote of 19,829, 16,976 say that they voted the Republican ticket in 1920 and 4,010 say they voted Democratic with 5,154 not voting. It appears, therefore, that Mr. La Follette is drawing heavily from both sides in the coast state."

In Illinois, the La Follette vote

of 12,726 is drawn from 2,375 former Democrats and 6,715 former Republicans, with 3,333 who did not vote in 1920. Mr. Coolidge's vote of 26,305 in the same state is drawn, 28,835 from former Republicans and 1,256 from former Democrats, with 5,917 not specifying.

"Mr. Davis' vote of 8,147, however, includes almost as many former Republican voters as Mr. Coolidge's includes former Democrats. In spite of his total vote of less than one-fourth of the number credited to Mr. Coolidge, the Democratic candidate has captured 1,380 ex-Republicans. The whole matter of this floating vote, will, of course, gain in significance with increasing returns."
