Hints for the Housewife

A WHOLESOME BAKED DINNER

Most housewives do not realize that even dishes require really less attention than those prepared on top of the stove. But those who are fortunate enough to have self-basting roasters were roasters, know from experience that this is a fact. The old-fashioned way of basting the meat every ten minutes or so did keep one almost constantly on the job if the meat was to be well-flavored and browned.

The enameled ware roaster, which not only roasts but bastes as well, has eliminated all the attention and thought that the old method involved.

Roasts are said to be much better for one than fried foods and an additional advantage is that potatoes and vegetables can be roasted with the meat, which saves considerable time. White and Bermuda onions are on the

market now and for a change from the usual boiled and creamed style of preparing them, try roasting them with the beef and potatoes.

Select a six-pound roast, wipe with a damp cloth, sprinkle with salt, pepper and flour and cook in a very hot oven for twenty minutes. Then place around the meat six or eight large peeled potatoes and the same number of medium sized onions. Season the potatoes and onions, cover and cook at the same temperature for forty-five minutes.

CHURCHES TO FIGHT 'DOPE'

WASHINGTON, (Special) —

Tens of thousands of congregations will back the American plan for the suppression of the "drug evil" before the International Opium Conference in Geneva in November if plans launched by church leaders are carried out.

A call has gone from the Commission on International Justice and Goodwill of the Federal Council of Churches to the Christians of America to support by thousands of resolutions the famous "American policy" calling for the total eradication of opium plants except to meet medical and scientific needs. The petitions will be presented to the World Conference by Bishop Charles H. Brent, one of the three American delegates appointed by President Coolidge. Congress had made an appropriation for the expenses of the delegation.

The American delegates will make a strenuous fight for the control of the traffic in habit-forming narcotic drugs, but leaders in the right believe that it is essential for the world to know that they have the backing of the American people. Authorities on the "drug evil" declare that only by world-wide cooperation can it be suppressed.
