Fashion Notes

New York is a foreign house for fashions. No sooner is a model created here or in Paris than suddenly, within a few days, it appears on Fifth Avenue with surprising speed and accuracy. Certain drastic changes require time for acceptance by the rank and file of women here as well as elsewhere. But there is always an advance guard, a sort of flying squadron of girls who display the new fashions however radical and different.

Tunics Popular. While the tunic blouse was still a matter of conjecture among the more conservative element, it bloomed in all its variety on Fifth Avenue. The first ones were the imported models of embroidered batiste or net worn over black satin slips. That was a couple of months ago. Now every other woman is wearing either a tunic or a tunic dress. The sleeveless model has held full sway during the hot months but now there is a tendency to exploit the long sleeved tunic. The lightest breath of cooler weather and the streets are thronged with women wearing the long-sleeved garment, perhaps a tailored model of black bengaline, possibly, or some of the heavier crepes.

This long tunic, for it must be long to be fashionable, is a highly becoming garment. It has all the charm and distinction of a dress with the added advantage of lending itself admirably to many and inexpensive changes. With one black satin slip, for instance, a woman may array herself in this morning or for luncheon in a tunic of black or dark blue bengaline, with collars and cuffs of crisp white organdy and simple belt of smooth kid, one of the latest tailored models. And for afternoon wear that same slip may be worn under a tunic of cut velvet with fur edging the hem and sleeves, or under one of the elaborately embroidered ones with gold threads gleaming. Then for theater nothing could be smarter than one of the French imported beaded tunics, with geometric patterns worked out in red, blue and gold beads on a black background. This is usually a sleeveless model and its neckline is gracefully rounded.

Heather Ornaments. Another instance of the sudden acceptance of certain fashions is the general use of soft leather or kid for belts and dress ornaments. There has been only an occasional hint of the ruffled waistline in the

news from French courtiers but the Fifth Avenue girl is already showing her trim waist (surprisingly trim considering its untrammeled state) encircled by one of the new wide kid epaulettes placed where nature meant the waistline to be.

A novelty that will not range too far because it is so expensive, is a collar, cuff and belt set of gold covered kid. These skins are imported from France and are covered with real gold leaf so their effect is beautifully rich and authentic. A set of this sort glorifies not only the American girl, but the plainest sort of frock.

Other leather novelties are muffs made of suede sometimes beaded or embroidered, to be used on the front of a frock at the waistline, and with cuffs and collars to match. Sometimes the kid belt is matched to other fabrics as in a tunic of black bengaline over an undershirt of green and black plaid, a soft suede belt repeating the shade of green known as shibboleth. A frequent form of trimming is collar, cuff and belt set of cream white French kid cut in a perforated pattern and worn with a black frock with stunning effect, especially if the hat, shoes and stockings carry out the magic effect.

PLANE LICENSE TARGET

SALEM, Ore. — T. A. Rafferty, chief inspector for the state motor vehicle department, recommended to the secretary of state that he cancel the license covering the operation of the airplane owned by L. Elwert of Sherwood, which fell here Saturday and resulted in the death of George F. Rogers, president of the First National bank here, and Miss Claire Crewe of Portland.

Mr. Rafferty also requested the state board of aeronautics to revoke the pilot's license issued to Richard Husbright of Portland, who was operating the ill-fated craft. Destruction of all parts of the Elwert plane, with the exception of the engine and metal rods was recommended to the state board of aeronautics by Mr. Rafferty.

At the next legislature Mr. Rafferty said he would recommend the creation of a board of mechanical experts to inspect all airplanes for which licenses are requested.

MAN KILLED, ONE INJURED
