future betterment and welfare of "Young America" if an opportunity to serve in such capacity was more generally accorded the pony?

24 Years Old. "The well known Levy Shetland Pony business at Union, Oregon, originated in 1901, when the owner, M. S. Levy, purchased the little jet black stallion 'Teddy Macdonald,' an individual of excellent bloodlines, conformation, substance, and action. A little later he acquired six mares. Mr. Levy then bought some ten or 12 acres of good alfalfa ground adjacent to the city, on which was built barn accommodation for ten ponies. As time went on and the herd increased, further necessary barns were added, with housing room for 50 ponies, paraphernalia and equipment incident to an up-to-date pony farm.

"The various buildings, barns, rooms etc., are supplied with electric lighting throughout, while water is obtained anywhere on the premises at will, by means of pumping apparatus propelled by gasoline engine.

Herd Improved. "To this nucleus herd foundation has been added from time to time, animals of merit and reasonable bloodlines. From well known breeding establishments in the east, thus from small beginning, the Levy herd of ponies has grown until it is now the largest west of the Missouri river. In starting this well known herd of ponies at Union, Oregon, the owner was fortunate in his selection of the best strains available. The very liberal spirit of his neighbors won by the Levy ponies at the various fairs and shows, of which they have been exhibitors, is ample proof of this assertion.

"The jet black 'four in hand' and covered wagon, which took part in the present celebration at Meacham on July 3 and 4, 1923, (when our late lamented president very kindly granted the occasion by his presence, and formally dedicated the Old Oregon Trail highway), attracted general attention and unlimited numbers of the crowds, and the click of camera could be heard on all sides, as visitors generally were obtaining pictures of the well appointed city little turnout. As for the ponies themselves, they never appeared to better advantage than they did on this memorable occasion. As it by intuition, they seemed to know they were on dress parade, and pranced along in the large parade ring doing their full towards helping to celebrate that important historical event, the silver anniversary of the pioneers' first wagon trail, that led to the vast country beyond, where roamed the Oregon."

bers of the league of nations today. When the election was announced the entire Chinese delegation left the auditorium later explaining their action was based on being ordered to leave the contest if China was not given a seat.

AUSTRALIA DISENTS. MELBOURNE, Australia, City (The Associated Press).—A declaration that Australia will not accept a compromise reached by the league of nations on the Japanese demand for submission of racial disputes to arbitration, was made public today by William Higgins, former premier of the commonwealth. Higgins declared it was evident Japan was determined to bring under the jurisdiction of the league any nation taken by another country against Japanese immigration.

Congregationalists in Session. SALEM, Ore.—The first session of the annual state conference of Congregational churches opened here yesterday. Dr. William H. Douglas of Eugene, moderator of the conference, was in charge and outlined the business of the session. The principal address today was given by Dr. Clement H. Clarke of the Portland First Congregational church.

Body Found in Well. SALEM, Ore.—The body of a woman, C. Higgins, who has resided on a ranch eight miles east of Salem for several years, was found at the bottom of a well on his farm. Officers said that Mrs. Higgins apparently fell into the well while working about her farm. He was 72 years of age. Besides his widow he is survived by eight children and other relatives.
