CHESS MASTER DEAD IN LONDON

LONDON. (AP)—J. H. Blackburn, an outstanding figure in British chess, who was accounted one of the finest tournament players that ever lived, died recently at the age of 83.

Blackburn received his early inspiration in chess from Paul Morphy, the American prodigy, whom he met in 1859. Then it was that he took up the study of chess with a self-confidence born of youth and genius. It is said that no player was ever more successful in exhibitions of blindfold and simultaneous play.

In 1862 Blackburn's success in an exhibition of blindfold play in London against ten strong amateurs most astonished his critics. On that occasion he won five games and drew two. It was the first to meet 12 and then 15 opponents without sight of board and men, and at Baden-Baden he was preparing to deal "blind-fold" with no fewer than 40 opponents when the Franco-German war broke out and scattered the gathering of players.

With a smile, recalling the incident in later years, Blackburn remarked: "Perhaps it was as well for me."

12,000 in Saar States Lose Jobs.

SAARBRUCKEN (AP)—Twelve thousand workmen are added to the unemployment of the Saar state by the announcement of the Reichling Iron & Steel Works, closing down the plant. A deficit of 25,000,000 marks was shown on the last balance sheet, since which time the works have been kept running by state subsidies.
