Produce Smut Proof Out.—A new government publication entitled "Markon, an Out Variety Immune from Covered Smut," is ready for distribution. This bulletin gives the history of and the results obtained with the new Markon oat variety developed by the Branch Experiment Station at Moro, Oregon. This oat variety in addition to being immune from smut is apparently well adapted to many sections of the Northwest, especially eastern Oregon and eastern Washington. It is a high-yielding, early maturing variety with short straw and long slender kernels. Because of its disease resistance and yielding ability it is considered a very valuable addition to the oat varieties of the Northwest. Farmers interested in this publication may obtain copies free from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., or from the Sherman Branch Experiment Station, Moro, Oregon.

HEAD LETTUCE YIELD HEAVY

Three Fields Near Joseph Prove Adaptability of Wallowa County to Culture.

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special).—Head lettuce is proving a very successful commercial crop on three fields near Joseph, where growers were not daunted by last year's failure. Profiting by that experience, the gardeners planted their seed much later, generally starting about the middle of July and continuing for a couple of weeks. Few plants have gone to seed and those which have formed firm, hard heads, states a local newspaper.

L. H. Russell has three acres near his home, on the highway in the edge of Joseph. Ralph Holt and Leo Patten have two acres, and Hugh Wilson has two acres. Mr. Wilson began his planting July 12 and finished July 26. The last planting will not make a crop because it was not watered when the seed was put in the ground, and so got a slow start. Other lettuce planted date is yielding well, where the ground was wet when the seed was put in.

The prospects are that the yield will run from 150 to 200 crates an acre, and the lettuce is shipped through La Grande. The net price to the grower promises to be about 35¢ a crate, which makes a profitable crop. A large acreage of head lettuce was planted in the valley last year when the first experiment was made with the crop. The gardeners insisted on putting in their seed between the first and the middle of June and it came up and grew amazingly in the early summer, but practically all went to seed in the warm days of August. Experience proved in other places round difficultly in producing heads when the crop matures in hot weather, and the same condition prevailed here.

Most of the experimenters of the first year concluded they had had enough, but the few at Joseph felt that the early planting and summer maturing of the 1923 crop were responsible for the failure, and the results they have won this season form strong evidence that they have reasoned correctly. It is probable that future lettuce growing will be on a conservative and careful scale.

longer to railroad more party measures through.

This may be so. But a three-party system is going to be mighty awkward when it comes to electing a president.

A candidate, to be elected president, must get a majority of all votes cast.

With three pretty evenly balanced parties, no candidate ever could do this. That would mean three-

ing the election into the House of Representatives every four years. And the House, also divided into three major or less equal groups, would decide the final time, too. So the Senate's view of presidential choice would be, really, the presidential choice.

The people, in short, wouldn't vote for the president. They'd vote for the vice president for president.

Abolishing the electoral college, which some have suggested, would not help matters a bit, either. A popular vote can split quite evenly three ways, so that no candidate has a "majority over all," as easily as the electoral college can.

The only alternative would seem to be to let the plurality winner take the job, and that would mean having a minority president all the time.

Besides, the constitution would have to be changed, though in these times nobody minds that.

fought a hard and bloody war to win its independence and to establish government by majority.

supply from this source to take care of the town of La Grande for some years to come. While we had no facilities for making measurements, I would say that on the 8th of August when we were there, there was one million gallons a day going down Beaver Creek that did not enter the pipe line. I saw enough leaks in the pipe line to make up the difference between this amount and the requirements of the city.

Make Recommendations.—I think that with the expenditure of approximately \$100,000, La Grande could take care of their water supply very nicely. My recommendation would be to protect the dam which is an absolute necessity, by filling in with earth on both sides of the concrete wall. This would be much cheaper than rebuilding the wall.

The defective pipe should then be replaced and for this purpose I would use a creosoted wood stave pipe 2 inches larger than that to be replaced. Most of that to be replaced is in bad shape. By replacing this with a larger line, it will provide for increased capacity and whenever any of the upper part of the line is replaced, this policy should be followed, so that ultimately the capacity of the whole line will be considerably increased.

There is one leak on the line which should be improved by lowering the pipe line about 20 feet, across the crest of this summit.

I believe you have a storage capacity of about 120,000,000 gallons in the reservoir and from what I saw, I would not recommend spending the amount of money that would be necessary to remove all of the sludge from this reservoir.

Water is O. K.—I drank some of the water as it entered the pipe line and am sure that no one could have objections

to the taste of this water. What you need most is to protect the dam and make your pipe line tight. In addition to the replacement suggested, there are a number of places on the wood stave portion where new collars will have to be put on.

It seems to me that it would be much better policy to take care of your water problem in this way than to burden the community with a bond issue of more than \$200,000 for an entirely new project. It seems to me that some arrangement should be made so that a certain amount of the revenue from the water supply could be set aside to take care of maintenance and improvements. There is enough income from the water plant to ultimately retire the bonds
