WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press)—Batting with indomitable courage that carried them to their first American league pennant, Washington's Senators Sunday turned the tables on the New York Glants, won the second game of the 1921 world's series and put themselves back into the thick of one of the most stirring struggles ever staged for baseball's greatest honors.
In a fashion, flash, equally as spectacular as the climax to Saturday's opening tussle and tides as thrilling to another capacity home crowd of 35,953, Roger Peckinpaugh, veteran Washington shortstop, lifted himself to heroic heights by driving across the winning run in the ninth after the Glants had knocked Zachary, southpaw star, from the box and tied the score with two rallies in their part of the final inning.
Shift to New York
The final score was 5 to 3, the same margin as in the first game, and Sunday night two of the "fightin'" clubs that ever met for the championship shifted their battle ground to New York, where the third game will be played today.

WASHINGTON FANS MOB CLUBHOUSE TO GREET THEIR HEROES

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hundreds of Washington fans, not all of whom were boys or men, crowded around the Senators' clubhouse after Sunday's victory and demanded their heroes to appear.
"Come out, Bucky," they commanded the young manager, whose individual playing was such a factor in the battle. Harris was busy with preparations for departure to New York and did not appear.
"Through the door," the mad mob clamored, "let them come in." The clubhouse had slipped through a rear exit. He was located in his new limousine, gift of fans from Cleveland, his home city, and police were required to break up the informal reception held on the running board.
Every Washington player was cheered as he appeared.
"It's only one of nine," manager Harris said, when commended upon his week arid and at last. "But I think we have a good chance to beat the Glants now."
Harris said that Marberry, who checked the Glant rally Sunday, would start Monday's game in New York.
The Glants, hurrying to catch their train, had little to say, but their faces carried determined looks which promise another severe battle when the two well-matched clubs meet at the polo grounds Monday. McQuillan, big left hander, who pitched so impressively in his last start against Pittsburgh, is the probable New York moundman, with Virgil Barnes as second choice.

GIANTS WIN
BALTIMORE (AP)—The Baltimore Orioles defeated the Solons of the American association in the fourth game of the world series here Sunday, 6 to 4.
The Orioles, who were leading 3-0 in the eighth, were held to a 1-0 record in the final inning by a brilliant performance by pitcher Zachary, who pitched a complete game and struck out 10 batters.

WILL INVITE CINEMA MEN

GENEVA, (AP)—Declaring that there are at least 10,000 cinema halls in the world and that the moving picture is steadily increasing as an international force for good or evil, Jules Luchaire, Honorary Professor of Geneva University, France, and Inspector-General of Public Education, recently urged the League of Nations conference on Intellectual Co-operation congress which would bring together representatives of writers, producers, motion picture critics and directors.
Professor Luchaire listed the moving picture as one of the most important movements in the history of intellectual life in the course of the last 25 years. He said its influence on the people can only be compared in part to that of the latest film from Los Angeles. He said that the cinema has been adapted to religious propaganda in various countries, and that in the United States it is estimated that about 25,000 churches use the screen as an adjunct to the pulpit. For all these reasons and for the additional one that the cinema has become increasingly international, Professor Luchaire held that it should be included within the scope of the activities of the Committee on Intellectual Co-operation.
The future alone will divulge the speaker intimated, whether the cinema is to have high educational value and the elevating and ennobling influence which the theaters seem to have had on the masses in ancient Greece, or the degrading influence of vulgar vaudeville shows or of cheap movies. The French professor said he was convinced that great things could be accomplished by an international conference in the way of leading the cinema into channels which would be productive of good for humanity.
