Freight Business May Break Record, Belief

Without any strain on the transportation machine the railroads probably, at the present time are loading and moving more freight cars each week than ever before in history," says the Standard. "The number of cars loaded in the week ended September 29 was 1,074,151. This was 15,742 more than in the corresponding week of 1923 and only two per cent less than the record figure of 1,095,254 which was reached in the last week of September, 1922. The record of cars loaded in the week ended September 29 this year was never equaled before 1923 and was exceeded in only four weeks of last year. Total loadings amounted to 132,848 cars, a week between the fourth week in July and the third week in September. There is no reason to doubt there has been a further increase since then.

"In spite of the big increase in loadings the railroads on September 15 had a surplus of more than 157,000 cars. This was a decline, however from more than 222,000 surplus cars at the end of July. They can still handle a substantially larger business without car shortage, if weather conditions stay good.

"If, however, traffic demands should continue to increase and severe weather should come it is to be expected that there will be a car shortage in the late fall or early winter. There is no imminent danger of a car shortage, but it is not too early to begin a campaign to get shippers to load cars heavier. The average loading of cars recently has not been so heavy as it should be and to make sure there will be no shortage of cars the average

The Northland

Though nothing of a sensational character was accomplished by the MacMillan expedition, which has returned to the United States after 15 months of exploration in Northern Greenland, it is scarcely to be questioned, in view of Captain Donald S. MacMillan's declaration that he attained practically all of his objectives, that the voyage was worth while. It is probable that mankind will benefit more by the scientific studies quietly pursued by the party than it would by a spectacular dash to the North Pole.

There is reason to suppose that the inhospitable regions in which the expedition has spent the last year will be visited more and more by white men, some of whom may establish homes in the Arctic. It is important, therefore, that mankind get all the information possible in regard to the resources and conditions in that land. MacMillan is contributing to world knowledge of the region.

Lest those unfamiliar with the situation may consider as fantastic the suggestion that white men may take up their abode in the territory now inhabited only by Eskimos, it is pertinent to point out that the Canadian government has already established police posts, postoffices and customs houses on Ellesmere Island and Baffin Island. Ellesmere Island is in the same latitude as Northern Greenland and MacMillan's original intention was to winter there, but he was prevented by ice conditions and lack of food. The commander of the Canadian expedition which established the police post on Ellesmere Island declared on his return that the possibilities of the country are great and that if the Canadian government continues to show an interest in it the resulting increased knowledge concerning the region will stimulate additional interest by private individuals and corporations, and a natural healthy development will speedily follow.

An aviator sent by the Canadian government to pick locations for landing fields in the Arctic country said in his report: "It may surprise many people to realize that 2,000 miles north of Ottawa the climate of the winter season is no more severe than in many of the more northerly settled parts of Saskatchewan and Manitoba, and that there are hundreds of square miles of land bare of snow in summer, covered with beautiful flowers, grass and moss, supporting innumerable animals, including caribou, muskoxen and foxes; and there are immense areas of coal and indications of many other minerals." He suggested that aerial transportation might do for this region what the introduction of railroads did for the prairie provinces.

MacMillan reports that the Eskimos beyond the Arctic circle are rapidly adopting civilization and the white man's ways, which indicates that the Caucasian race is moving into that quarter of the globe just as it has into most other sections.

The conquest of the Polar region is proceeding. Expeditions like MacMillan's are accelerating it.
