EUGENE, Ore. (Special)—With a few exceptions, the members of the University of Oregon football squad hail from Oregon cities. The state of Washington is the home of four, Johnson, two-year letterman, Kohnowick, Bliska, guard, Cape Horn; Dills, end, Takima, and Gerald, lineman, Nemo.

California is the home of Jackson, Hines, guard, who is from Ukiah; Portland is the home of Maul, end; Cash, Leavitt, Doolson, Almonough, backfield; Bert Kidwell, Stockwell, Toole, Carlberg and Powers, linemen; Donaldson, French, Tompkins and Stonebreaker, all backfield men.

Oregon City is the home of two Oregon centers, Wilson, veteran, and Johnson, a promising candidate. Eugene has several men on the varsity squad, Barton, Vito, McAllister, backfield; Murray, Captain Reed, Kerns, Bailey, McMillen, March, linemen; North Bond in Coos county sends Anderson, letterman in the backfield, and Kjolund, a good bet on the line. Jones and Woodruff, backfield men, hail from Salem. Agnew, freshman backfield candidate, is from McKinville. Gooden, a strong bidder for the tackle job, is from Woodburn. Bliska, letterman of several years back, comes from Ione; Kelly and Stevens, linemen; Stafford, and Smith, a backfield prospect, Glendale.

Railroads Are Against Autoists Riding Friends

ATLANTIC CITY (AP)—Generous motorists who give free rides to neighbors and strangers who regularly collect "tips" rather than pay car fare, are seriously interfering electric railway receipts. James W. Welch, secretary of the American Electric Railway Association, declared in a statement, Mr. Welch is here to open the association convention Tuesday.

The charges that the situation is such that many companies are resorting to advertising in newspapers and magazines to offset the "tip" practice. Small city properties are suffering most, Mr. Welch said. "Holding traffic is bound to mean higher fares, if nothing more serious, he thinks."

Advertising now being used to offset the "tip" habit stresses "free riding" motorists can notice by giving free rides, and are responsible for accidents to their passengers, free motor, ride-railway receipts and camped curtailment or abandonment of service, curtailed or abandoned service, curtailment of property values, and many motor car owners own property, many persons, solicit free rides, to save car fare.

"The fact is that kind treated motor car owners are thinking are helping to drive the small electric railway properties to the wall by their ride-railway receipts," Mr. Welch continued. "The association is in contact with virtually every electric railway in the United States and a very large majority of them are great inroads are being made on their receipts by the free ride practice."

"Two classes of persons are preying on the motor car owner in this connection. They are the peddlers who put 'tip' into the hands of riding motorists with him, and the out-and-out side peddlers who write along the roadside and openly solicit free rides. The latter problem is the hardest one for electric railways and motorists to compete with. Motorists generally, most of whom understand the primary economics of business, admit that free riding free rides is hurting electric railways, but that they dislike to pay 'tip' to their neighbors. Many do refuse rides to the 'regulars' who have straggled along the roadside."
