PENDLETON, Ore. (Special)—A deal for the purchase of 44 acres of land belonging to H. W. Collins has been closed by the state game commission whereby the state comes into ownership of the land for its use as a state game farm, according to J. W. Maloney, member of the commission.

The land is east of town and is north of the Pendleton gun club. It is bounded on the south by the main line of the O-W, R. & N. and on the north by the Camilla river. The price paid for the land was \$4,000, or \$100 the acre.

JOHNSON MAY NOT BE BACK

Grand Old Twirler of Baseball Hints He Has Pitched Last Game in Major Leagues.

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—Walter Johnson said Wednesday after he was beaten for the second time during the world series by the Giants that it was doubtful if he would play ball next year.

The big pitcher, who waited 14 years to get into baseball classic, would not elaborate on his statement, but did say a report that he had bought stock in the Oakland club of the Pacific Coast league.

"I could not hold them," he said referring to the game which he evidently considered to be his last appearance in a world series, if not in big league baseball.

"I am sorry," he continued, "I had two chances to beat them but I could not hold them either time."

Manager Harris was philosophical. "They made breaks and they beat us," he said. "Life is that way. But we'll catch them tomorrow. Zerkowich, veteran shortstop, whose absence with a "charley horse" has been severely felt during the last three games, was so determined to play, "I'll get in that game if I break a leg."

Manager McGraw was in happy spirits as he took the field to be escorted by a motorcade to catch the special train engaged to take the players of both teams to Washington shortly before 6 o'clock.

"I think Neft will be ready to use tomorrow," he said. "His hand was in fine shape today and 24 hours should make a lot of difference. If Neft cannot work, Harris will get another chance."

The veteran manager would not predict an end of the series Thursday.

"Washington is a good team and anything can happen in baseball, you know," he said.

JOHNSON DEFEAT CASTS GLOOM OVER WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON (AP)—Walter Johnson's second defeat at the hands of the New York Giants Wednesday cast somewhat of a gloom over Washington Wednesday night. Fans were disappointed because Johnson again failed in an effort to pitch a world series victory to his long string of wins for the Senators.

Return of the Senators Wednesday night, however, lightened matters to some extent and from practically every quarter satisfaction was expressed that the battle ground for the world series baseball championship had shifted from the polo grounds to Griffith stadium.

The capital has taken as an omen of good luck the fact that Clark Griffith won the toss of the coin to determine that the seventh game, if necessary to decide the title, would be held here.

CINCINNATI (AP)—A blood transfusion operation was performed on Jason Daubert, first baseman of the Cincinnati Nationals, in an effort to save his life at the Good Samaritan hospital here Wednesday.
