WASHINGTON (NEA Special).—Just why did Teddy Roosevelt resign his job as assistant secretary of the navy after he had been nominated as the G. O. P. candidate for governor of New York?

This is a question that is receiving a seemingly absurd amount of consideration here in Washington. Offhand, the simple and probably correct answer would seem to be that he resigned so as to be free to plunge full tilt into his battle to unseat Governor Al Smith, his democratic rival.

But simple and direct answers do not satisfy the politically suspicious here in the capital. They are always seeking some underlying motive. To be obvious, they hold, isn't politics "There must always be something back of everything that is done."

After cogitating on the fact that other federal office holders have not resigned in order to prosecute their campaigns, that President Coolidge kept on being president; that Governor Bryan has held onto his job as governor of Nebraska; that Senators La Follette and Wheeler, following the example of Senator Harding when he was running for president, have held onto their jobs pending the result of the election, these wiseacres have found an "explanation" which is interesting, whether it is accurate or not.

Teddy, this explanation goes, resigned as assistant secretary of the navy in order that he might be eligible for appointment as secretary of the navy in case he is defeated for governor of New York and Coolidge still wins for the presidency.

Politicians generally take it for granted Secretary Wilson will not be retained in the official family should Coolidge succeed himself. Wilson, cabinet critics hold, hasn't measured up. Whatever his ability, he isn't sufficiently politically minded, they say, to make a successful departmental head.

The speech which he delivered while out west, prior to his recent

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (By the Associated Press).—Lucia Bravo, 22, and her brother, Ventura Bravo, 26, were killed and their mother, Mrs. S. Pinero, seriously wounded by knife slashes in an attack by an admirer of Lucia here today.

Police are searching for Damian Sandoval, of Compton, declared by the ten-year-old sister of the victims to have been the attacker.

Rosa Bravo, 16, witnessed the shooting. Her life was threatened when she attempted to leave the room before the player made his escape, according to the police. Her story, police say, was that Sandoval became enraged when they refused to drink liquor with him.

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Army Blimp
Damaged By
Explosion

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. (By the Associated Press).—The army blimp TC-2, the largest non-rigid lighter-than-air craft built in the United States, was badly damaged and several of the crew were injured today when a bomb in the blimp exploded prematurely while the ship was in the air over Langley field here.

Lieutenants Bruce Martin and Alfred Purser were seriously injured.

The bomb explosion broke the gas bag of the ship which came down as the non-inflatable helium gas occupied. The crew had no time to take to parachutes and the extent of the damage is undetermined. The fact that non-inflatable gas was in the bag probably prevented the loss of lives of all the crew and greater damage to the bag.

National Grange Master Asks Coolidge to Hold Up Investigation

L. J. TABER FEARS
POLITICAL RACE

Thinks Any Commission Appointed to Look into Farm Situation Would Be Influenced.

WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press).—The request that the proposed investigation of agricultural conditions be withheld until after election was made to President Coolidge today by Louis J. Taber, master of the national grange.

Taber said he feared if the president appointed a commission now its work would become involved in partisan politics. Similar arguments have been pressed before Coolidge by other farm leaders. He recently indicated he did not consider haste necessary.

"The commission, if appointed now would be bound to get entangled in partisan politics and this would be disastrous to the farming situation. The farmers definitely have turned the road. I think the proper commission, working along economic lines, can do much to carry out the program of the president to prevent the recurrence of past distress," said Taber.

FIRE AT NOLIN
CAUSE OF BIG
PROPERTY LOSS

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special).—A loss of approximately \$80,000 to \$85,000 was done Thursday when fire of an unknown origin destroyed the H. W. Collins grain elevator and warehouse at Nolin, 18 miles west of Pendleton.

In addition to the two buildings owned by Mr. Collins, the "mail" railroad waiting room and a section house owned by the O. W. R. & N. were consumed by the flames, and damage to the track of the carrier company was done. Between 45,000 and 50,000 bushels of wheat and barley are said to have been stored in the two buildings, part of it being owned by Mr. Collins but a much larger volume was the property of farmers.
