SOLON-ROXIE DEAL IS AIRED

BURLINGTON, Ia. (By the Associated Press)—An alleged affidavit by A. L. Fink, of Buffalo, N. Y., describing Fink's version of how Senator Wheeler induced Roxie Stinson to testify against ex-Artillery-General Daugherty, was read last night by Daniel F. Steek, democratic candidate for United States senator from Iowa, in a campaign speech. Mr. Steek charged with his republican opponent, Senator Brookhart, assisted in obtaining Fink's services to induce Miss Stinson to testify. Steek said he had started petitions to Attorney-General Stone requesting an investigation of the Daugherty investigation committee.

The affidavit said that Fink, in return for assistance in the senate investigation, was promised the office of internal revenue collector in Buffalo, and that his attorney, Henry Stern of Buffalo, was promised a federal judgeship in New York. The affidavit said these promises were made by Senator Wheeler. It asserted that Wheeler promised Miss Stinson opportunity for personal gain on the New York stock market if she would testify.

SACRAMENTO, Cal.—Senator Wheeler of Montana, now independent vice-presidential candidate, but also "prosecutor" of the senate Daugherty investigating committee, was informed that A. L. Fink of Buffalo, had issued an affidavit charging him with offering inducements to get testimony in that affair, particularly from Miss Roxie Stinson. He promptly issued a denial.

Dramatic Disclosure Is Made at Rudeen Trial Before Portland Court

PORTLAND—Barney Marsh, an applicant for the county bridge engineering job, permitted to testify against Charles S. Rudeen, ex-county commissioner, yesterday, after one of the big legal battles of the ex-official's trial, was indicted on a bribery charge by the same special grand jury which indicted Mr. Rudeen and his associates.

Disclosure that Mr. Marsh was indicted but promised immunity in return for appearing against Mr. Rudeen was one of the dramatic episodes of a day of action in the trial before Circuit Judge Morrow.

At the end of testimony by Marsh to the effect that he negotiated with Mr. Rudeen and Robert E. Kremers, engineer who landed the job and was subsequently indicted for bribery, in fixing up a \$50,000 "pot," came the disclosure concerning cross-examination. The defense forced from the witness details of his part in this particular plot, the bribery indictment standing against him, the manner of obtaining immunity and his admitted use of intoxicating liquor while in Portland seeking the contract.

The defense attorneys left no stone unturned in paving the way for obvious attempt to impeach Marsh's testimony.

Both Sides Score Points. Mr. Marsh had been placed on the stand Monday as a surprise witness for the prosecution. After a few questions in which he started to tell of the \$50,000 plot to buy the engineering contract he had been asked to name the agent to whom this sum was to be handed. At this point the defense attorneys objected and for two days a legal battle over admissibility of his testimony was waged.

Just before noon yesterday Judge Morrow ruled that Mr. Marsh might return to the stand, give the name of the agent and further testimony. This was a victory for the prosecution.

At the same time the judge gave two rulings in favor of the defense which were joyfully received by it. He ruled that the prosecution must show that bribe money was actually paid to Mr. Rudeen. He held further that the transaction must have occurred between January 4 and 26, 1922. Those rulings are

expected to become difficult barriers for the prosecution to pass. One of the prosecutors stated in court Wednesday that the state might not conclusively show that Mr. Rudeen actually received money.

Time Limits Fixed. Judge Morrow, giving his ruling, said: "It is the conclusion of the court that the indictment charges the payment of money. The claim of the state that an agreement was in effect is sustained. In this I am overruling Mr. Maguire's objection to the last question asked of Mr. Marsh. I'll let the state show Mr. Marsh's testimony clear through."

Under this ruling, the judge explained in answer to a query of the defense, the defense attorneys would still hold the right to raise objection to points of Marsh's testimony.

On the two important points of the judge's ruling embraced by the defense as a victory, the judge made these remarks: "The offense could not have been committed prior to the 6th nor after the 26th. The state has now fixed the payment of money as occurring between these dates. The state will have to come down to the payment of money between January 6 and January 26."

A. J. Welton Named. At the opening of court after noon, after the defense had offered a motion to strike out all testimony of the witness and this had been overruled, Mr. Marsh was permitted to answer the famous question as to the name of the agent to whom Marsh and Kremers were to pay the \$50,000. "Whom did you tell Mr. Rudeen you and Mr. Kremers agreed to pay the \$50,000 to?" Prosecutor Mowry restated the question. "To Mr. A. J. Welton," answered the engineer.
