# La Grande Theatres

## "Sinners in Heaven" Glorifies South Sea Island Dancing Girls.

When "Sinners in Heaven," the new Paramount picture with Bob Daniels and Richard Dix, is flashed on the local screen at the Star theatre, tonight, motion picture patrons will have an opportunity of comparing American methods in the torchlight art with those that are most favored in the Tahiti Islands.

Those who have been privileged to get an advance look at the picture predict that it will do as much to glorify the native girls of the Bahamas as Florenz Ziegfeld has done for the American girl in his Follies.

All of which is due to Alan Cross, the director of the photoplay. He picked out twenty-four native beauties in Nassau, where the company made its headquarters while filming the exterior scenes for the picture on eight of the islands, and instructed them in a native dance.

The troupe was known as "Crossland's Follies" among the picture people, and every night at the hotel Crossland would put his "Tiger Girls of the Bahamas" through their paces for the entertainment of the guests. The affair got to be the talk of Nassau, and when the troupe was scheduled to do the dance before the camera, citizens of the town journeyed to the island on which the company was working to see the finished product.

"Gilda Gray with all her movements has nothing on these native girls," said the Paramount director. "They got so proficient in the so-called art of south-sea dancing that I had to break up their rhythm so the dance would not look as if it were a product of Broadway."

The religious festival of the natives at which these girls did their dance is one of the interesting scenes in "Sinners in Heaven."

The picture is based upon James Creelman's adaptation of Olive Ardren's famous prize-winning novel of the same name. Besides Miss Daniels and Mr. Dix, the cast includes Holmes Herbert, Montague Love, Effie Shannon, Florence Billings, Betty Hillburn and Marjorie Harris.

## Last Showing of "Scaramouche" at Sherrys Tonight.

"Scaramouche," now showing at the Sherry theatre, is a Rex Ingram production for Metro founded on Rafael Sabatini's novel, and adapted to the screen by Willis Goldbeck. The cast, which includes 10,000 players in the mob scenes, is headed by Ramon Novarro as Scaramouche, Alice Terry as Alina and Lewis Stone as the Marquis De La Tour D'Auvergne.

## Latest DeMille Picture Is a Timely Novelty Drama.

Cecil B. Despite the rage of the wealthy Bertha Lansell, played by Julia Payne, who is very interested in the picture, she is married on shipboard to Amy Lorine (Vera Reynolds). Bertha's half sister, Robert Edison is Doctor Lansell, (Bertha's husband).

Back in New York, six months in a Harlem flat finds Amy though happy, quite ready for a dance given by her half-sister. At the dance Harlan has to be a wall-flower.

Ricardo Cortez, playing Tony Channing, a wealthy rival, dances with Kerry's wife. At the dance, Harlan, unable to endure it longer, takes the floor, dances and collapses. It develops that his foot has now been so injured that death may come if he uses it within a year. It is now up to Amy Lorine to support her husband. Theodore Kosloff, playing Hendrick, a modiste, employs her as model in his establishment.

Then back and forth, we see the play of two dramatic forces, Harlan, helpless, knowing his wife needs recreation, has a dagger driven into his heart as "Channing" appears with his invitations. Amy, on her part, comes home at lunch time to find Bertha Lansell detouring the invalid with the things that money can buy. And in the background is the husband.

The young couple come to an absolute impasse. Disaster impends. And then in a manner novel, dramatic, DeMille cuts the knot and brings the story to a striking end through the introduction of a one-act play by Bertha Marie Dix called "Across the Border."
