School News

Edward W. Birchfield, defendant in the above suit, is hereby required to appear and answer the Complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before six full weeks after the first publication of this notice against you and if you fail so to answer and appear, for want thereof the plaintiff will pray the Court for judgment against you and the other defendants as follows:

For judgment and decree of the Court against the defendants Edward W.
