Freak Block of Ice Found Buried in Earth. RENO, Nev. (AP)—A freak of nature near here in the form of a huge solid block of ice buried 12 feet underground, measuring 66 feet in length, 20 feet in width and 19 feet in thickness, was uncovered recently by a steam shovel, while working on the new 72-mile Lee River highway. The workmen, after making numerous attempts to go around the ice, finally were forced to blast their way through it with high explosives. It is believed that originally the ice, which is estimated to be about 40 years old, was a field of snow on the mountain side above and was compressed into its present form by an avalanche of earth, rocks and trees.

## MANY OBSERVE COLUMBUS DAY

MADRID. (AP)—Columbus Day was celebrated through Spain Sunday. Here and in Barcelona the ceremonies were particularly brilliant. In most places meetings were held at which speeches were delivered commemorating the day, and wreaths were deposited on Columbus monuments. As a Spanish-American festival, Enrique Gonzalez Martinez, the Mexican minister, speaking on behalf of the diplomatic representatives of Latin America, made a plea for still closer relations between Spain and Latin America. School children played a prominent part in the celebration everywhere.

## EXPLORER CALLED ONE OF WORLD'S GREATEST

WASHINGTON. (AP)—President Coolidge, in a Columbus day letter to Vice Contessa, of New York, president of the Italian benevolent society, made public here Sunday, paid tribute to Christopher Columbus and to American citizens of Italian birth. Commenting on messages which he said made apparent that this year Columbus day would be "observed very widely," Mr. Coolidge recalled that Columbus in his own time "was repaid with little else than distrust, disappointment and ignominy."

## Inland Fishing Helps Finances of Indians

RED LAKE FALLS, Minn. (AP)—Red Lake Indians, the model Chippewa band of Minnesota, gathered this summer 750,000 pounds of fish from Red Lake. It has been announced by H. B. Dooley, superintendent of the Red Lake reservation. During the last seven years the Indians, under a contract with the state of Minnesota, have received more than \$500,000 for fish taken from the lake. The fishing season lasts but three months during the summer, but last summer four Indians

## Communists Decrease in European Countries

LONDON. (AP)—Membership of the Communist party in European countries is diminishing rapidly according to statistics recently published by Justice, the English Communist organ. The membership decline in Europe is shown by the following figures:

The total membership of the party, outside Russia, which was given as 1,064,000 in 1920, dropped to 674,142 in 1922 and 599,000 in 1924. The paper adds that the only countries where the Communists still retain an important place in the working class movement is in Germany, Czechoslovakia and France. In Germany it is only the subsidies received from Russia that keeps the party strength at normal, the paper adds.
