ST. PAUL (By the Associated Press).—St. Paul, winner of the American association pennant and the junior world series, will meet the championship team of the Pacific Coast league in a nine-game series for the "A. A." baseball title of the world. It was announced here Monday night.

ST. PAUL WINS SERIES. LEXINGTON PARK, Md. (By the Associated Press).—St. Paul won the junior world series and the minor league championship here Monday afternoon, defeating Baltimore 6 to 2 in the ninth and deciding game.

Displaying a fighting spirit that would not be daunted, the St. Pauls, trailing Baltimore by three games to one when the series opened here, took the opening game Thursday, lost the next and won Baltimore Sunday but was swept for the championship, except through their opponents for three straight wins and the minor league title.

THE OREGONIAN (Special).—Hood River high school has been expelled from the Oregon high school athletic association for the remainder of the year, as a result of a football game played by a team from that school against Franklin high of Portland, according to a telegram received here today from the secretary of the state association.

The Dallas high school eleven was to have played Hood River Friday, but in view of the expulsion efforts are now being made for a rematch with Yakima, Wash.

The state association has a ruling which prohibits its members from placing against Portland high school intercollegiate association athletic teams.
