Henry Ford's Muscle Shoals Bid Withdrawn

The best possible waste of time, energy or money. If we cannot do what we want in one way, then we find another.

"We are moving so fast and the settlement of Muscle Shoals' future seemed so far away that we had to find other means to do the things we could have accomplished at Muscle Shoals. In fact, we have passed Muscle Shoals. Productive business cannot wait on politics. Therefore, we are withdrawing our bid."

Asked if that meant withdrawing absolutely from Muscle Shoals and everything that pertains to it, Mr. Ford replied:

"Yes, we have made our bid; now let them make us a bid. And they will not have to wait three years for their answer. We can tell them in five minutes."

After discussing the government investment in Muscle Shoals which he said was much larger than it ought to be, but which could not be helped because it was rush work done in war time for war purposes, Mr. Ford said:

"Our bid was intended to develop a method by which the public's money could be made productive and eventually returned to the public treasury at a profit, while at the same time we should produce nitrates at a sufficiently low cost to sell them to the farmers at a fraction of what they now have to pay. Also, we intended to create a plant which would not only make us independent of Chile for nitrates for explosives but would also be an independent source."

Mr. Ford said his company had completed the purchase of 100,000 acres of coal lands in Kentucky and after relating some of the experiments conducted at the Riverogue plant said:

"We find from our experience at Riverogue that we can generate electrical power in these coal lands to any extent that we may need and at a cheaper rate than we could under our bid at Muscle Shoals. And also we can generate in our own way entirely outside of all political influence or political meddling. That is why we have lost our interest in Muscle Shoals."

Asked what he thought ought to be done with Muscle Shoals, Mr. Ford replied:

"In any event, the public must not permit it to be broken up, for through its nitrate production it can be our greatest guarantee for peace on the one hand and for the farmers on the other. I believe the army engineers could carry it through if they were allowed to exercise their own judgment and work unhindered—for they are a fine lot of men. But probably the best course is that suggested by the president. But probably the best course is that suggested by the president—that is, to appoint an impartial commission."

Road Survey Is Urged

ALBANY, Ore.—In order to have authoritative data to present to the department of forestry at Washington, Representative Hawley has urged by committee from the Albany (Chamber of Commerce) to complete the survey of the proposed road over the Santiam pass this fall as a delay would mean the lapse of another year before the matter could be placed before the forestry officials.

Coolidge welcomes the team "as head of an enterprise which conducts some business and maintains a considerable staff in this town." He said that he had hopes that with the conclusion of the world series "the people of Washington may gradually resume interest in the ordinary concerns of life."

So despondent had government workers become during the closing weeks of the baseball season when Washington was still uncertain of the champion, the president said, that "I contemplated action of a vigorously disciplinary character."

And he praised as "a correct, constructive" and "statesmanlike program" the suggestion of Congressman John E. Miller of Seattle that a special session of congress be convened at once in order that congressmen would have an excuse to be in Washington at the time of the world series.
