KOENIGSBERG, Germany (AP)—A courier in the service of the German government, who travels frequently between Russia and Germany, has given up plans for the airplane. He has made his air trip from here and Moscow, a distance of 2,000 miles, and estimates he has thus saved himself 100 days of travel in uncomfortable trains.

LUMBER MART QUITE STEADY

Steadiness features the lumber market. Demand is of good volume and prices are well maintained, says the American Lumberman, Chicago. Continued large scale building operations in many cities, and some further expansion in the requirements of country trade, coupled with an active exportation to South America and the recent rise in demand for railroad and car materials, have again forced southern pine sales, close to the normal line and well in excess of production. Stocks of this wood meanwhile remain much depleted and order files are well filled, being equal to about 20 days' output at the current rate. The result is that, though transit cars are still plentiful and are sometimes offered at concessions, mill prices are strong and firm. Douglas fir retains its favorable position also. Building in some of the cities of the Pacific northwest is assuming something like boom volume, despite the lateness of the season; rail trade with the middle west and east is of fair proportions; the California market has improved considerably during the last month, and export demand continues robust and the normal line. Only on the Atlantic seaboard is the market for western lumber unsatisfactory, due to the large stocks consigned to it by cargo during the spring and summer. Coast mill stocks meanwhile are poor, and there is no eagerness for new business. Prices consequently are strong held, with no early weakening in prospect.

North Carolina pine has experienced another of the violent fluctuations that has characterized the market for this wood for some time. After having been poor for some weeks, orders took a sharp rise during the latter part of September, attaining 100 percent of production and exceeding output by 10 percent. While there are indications that sales will continue at this rate, it is expected that they will remain considerably ahead of the recent average during the rest of the fall. A decline in the movement of western pines is at the same time reported, but as the season for shutting down the mills is approaching, the market is preparing its equilibrium.

The feature of the hardwood movement is heavy foreign demand. It is reported by some concerns specializing in this trade that September in export demand over August, and that prospects were thus improved for some time. The domestic market has shown no notable change and on the whole is good. Hardwood prices are firm at levels that have prevailed during the last fortnight.

LOCAL MAN IN CUTTING FRAY

BAKER, Ore. (Special)—A newspaper operator employed in La Grande by the name of Cooper attacked Charles Beddingfield, also a newspaper operator, of Pleasant Valley, about 12 miles southeast of Baker on the main line late yesterday and cut him up so badly it was necessary for him to be taken to a hospital for treatment, state a local newspaper today.

The motive of the attack was probably jealousy as Beddingfield has been showing some attention to the divorced wife of Cooper since the newspaper account.

Local authorities are looking for Cooper today and if captured, he will be turned over to the Baker authorities, who have a warrant for his arrest.

25 WAGON LOADS OF BONES ENRICH UTAH UNIVERSITY

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The world's most unique museum is what University of Utah officials term the recent expedition to Salt Lake City from the Jensen, Utah, fossil quarry of 25 horse-drawn wagons loaded with the remains of prehistoric animals which are to be assembled in the museum of the institution.

Millions of years ago these monsters roamed the earth and, with their addition, the university hopes to have one of the most complete museums in the country.

In addition to the complete head of a carnivorous dinosaur, a variety of inestimable value, the bones ready for shipment are those of a brontosaurus, ceratops, stegosaurus and diplodocus.

Plans call for each wagon to be loaded with approximately 2,500 pounds of bones and driven by four horses. In all the total weight is estimated at 50,000 pounds.

For some time University of Utah workers under the direction of Dr. Earl Douglass of the Carnegie Museum of Pittsburgh, Pa., have labored to secure the specimens. With great industry they have picked the bones from the strata, prepared them with a concrete preparation and crated them.

DAVIS SPEAKS AT HIGH SCHOOL THIS MORNING
Ex-Governor Davis, of Idaho, spoke to the students of the La Grande high school this morning in an interesting manner, touching upon matters of importance today. A special student body assembly was called at nine o'clock when Mr. Davis was introduced prior to his address.

SPEAKERS PRaise RECORD OF G. O. P.
GOODING, Ida. (Special)—D.

W. Davis, former governor of Idaho, and William Spry, former governor of Utah, spoke for the Republican state ticket here Monday night at the Shubert theatre on the issues of the campaign. Both speakers paid especial attention to national questions, with emphasis on the tariff. Mr. Davis explained how the tariff had benefited the country, especially in 1920. He favored the Mellon plan of taxation.

Mr. Davis outlined accomplishments of the administration the last four years, and declared the success of the budget had been responsible for the reduction in governmental expenses. He played the Democratic party, and declared that should it get into power 50 of the 58 important committee chairmanships in congress would fall into the hands of representatives from south of the Mason and Dixon line. He denounced the claims of the La Follette faction as representing the interests of the country, claiming that at the same time the La Follette faction was a party of a few men.

Mr. Spry condemned the La Follette declaration for government ownership of railroads, saying that the cost would be ten billions to the government if the roads were purchased. He criticized the party platform of the Progressives. He paid tribute to the administration of Governor C. C. Moore and the work of Addison Smith. To Mr. Smith, he said, was credit due for Idaho's obtaining its large appropriation for reclamation work.

FAVORS OSTEOPATHY
The boys in the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis would have the services of osteopathic physicians on the staff of the gymnasium, if their Admiral A. T. Niblack could have his way.

Admiral Niblack has been a close student of the academy's gymnasium and the equipment. He helped establish the system now in use there, of making scientific tests of muscle groups, to find where the boys are in need of development and the type of gymnastic work which will benefit them most. He was also active in the development of the Swedish system of exercises in the Naval Academy gymnasium.

Admiral Niblack has recently had two articles published in the U. S. Naval Institute Proceedings, the official organ of the institute, in which he strongly urges the necessity of adding osteopathic physicians to the gymnasium staff. There were in the October, 1923, and January, 1924, numbers of the Proceedings.
