College Offers Prize For Student Drama

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—A scholarship and a prize of \$250 are offered to the group of American undergraduate students who most effectively produce and direct a one-act drama at Northwestern University on Jan. 1, 1922. The contest, national in scope, is under the auspices of Northwestern University School of Speech, which Robert J. Cunnock founded in Evanston in 1878.

In some respects the Cunnock Cup dramatic competition will resemble the Helms Cup contest, except that the former is to be limited to undergraduate students while the latter appeals directly to the community, or Little Theater group.

The regulations controlling the Cunnock contest provide for preliminary competitions Dec. 20 and 21, at the School of Speech theater here. At the final contest the three leading competing companies will act their plays and the judges will make their decision upon the closing of the last performance. The decision of the judges will be based upon choice of play, direction and acting.

The play may be any one-act comedy or heavy drama that can be presented in a maximum of 40 minutes. While any play may be selected, no play may be given by two clubs or groups. The right to present any given play shall be with the group making the first registration for that play. The casts will not be limited in numbers.

D. W. DAVIS LAUDS RULE OF G. O. P.

but that he had always regained his sense of reason before he voted. He reviewed the times in the last thirty years when Democrats had succeeded to power, telling of the stagnation of business following and the lack of employment.

That three billion dollars have been saved in governmental expenditures during the present administration; that a budget system is working for the first time in the nation's history in a way that brings government business under rigid supervision; that the deflation of farmers which the Democratic administration caused is gradually being overcome; that same economical administration is being practiced by Coolidge, were some of the points stressed by Governor Davis.

For Honesty.
He touched on the scandals at Washington saying, "I condone dishonesty in no man and my administration as governor of Idaho for two terms will prove it to you, but I do want to say that the Tea Pot Dome scandal has been grossly misrepresented and that the government is getting far better results from those leaders than from the leaders made by Democratic administration."

The speaker spoke with regret over the apparent attitude of John

W. Davis, Democratic candidate for president, claiming that Mr. Davis had always been a big man and that the methods he was resorting to in this campaign smacked of the demagogue.

No Cause for Worry.
As for La Follette and Wheeler the speaker said, "The noise of these two men will not worry anyone." And with this he reviewed the war record of Senator La Follette claiming when nearly everyone in America was bending every effort to win the world war La Follette stood on the floor of the senate with his vote blocking America's progress so much as he could add to the list of the boys who were fighting in France. As for Wheeler he stated pointedly that the vice presidential candidate with La Follette during the war was repeatedly dragged before the Council of Defense of Montana, Wheeler's home state, for attempting to assist enemies in dodging the military draft.

In closing his talk the speaker paid a beautiful tribute to Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge, whom he claimed

WALLOWA HAS FALL OF SNOW

WALLOWA, (Special)—The first fall of snow in the valley and lower hill sections was experienced here late last week. In parts of the hills the snow fell to a depth of a couple of inches, but melted away within a few hours. Moisture of any kind is greatly welcomed by the farmers and stockmen, all ranges being very dry and the rainfall has not been sufficient to start the new grass in amount to anything. Much of the fall-sown wheat has not come up well, due to the lack of moisture.

Bert Sarraff, government hunter and trapper, has been busy in this section during the past week, in distributing poison stations for coyotes. The coyotes have been very numerous in the hill sections near the woods this fall. Two stations have been placed in the hill country east of here. Mr. Sarraff expects to do some work in getting the coyotes with these stations as they are easy to poison at this time, due to the scarcity of food. Preparations are being made to begin work of surfacing a stretch of road from the cemetery east of town to the beginning of the surfaced portion of the Powwath market road on Whiskey creek. The stretch to be surfaced is about a half mile in length, and will be done by the county court by contract. The material for this work will be taken from the Mamford farm a short distance away. The Stanley line east of town was surfaced with this material a number of years ago and has stood up well, with a small amount of work since. Two trucks and three men will be engaged in hauling the material to the stretch of road to be surfaced. The closing of the Chinese pheasant season Sunday evening found many hunters in the fields busily engaged in trying to get the limit. The birds have been very shy since the season opened, and have been hard to locate. Great numbers of birds were killed on the first couple of days at the opening of the season.

Roy Gastin, George Cussins and John Anderson have been busy the past week hauling lumber from Powwath. The lumber will be used to build a machine shed by Mr. Gastin. He expects to start work on the building in a few days.

E. R. Roberts of Enterprise helped Sam Meck dig potatoes the latter part of the week. The potato crop in the dry sections of the county are said to be very light this year.

Grateful Owners Pay Doctor To Save Life of Herbie Cat

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—Blue Bell, a Persian cat that saved the lives of six persons in a fire, is recovering from a surgical operation undertaken to save her life. The operation was ordered by Mr. and Mrs. Carl V. Hall, owners of the cat, on advice that in no other way could Blue Bell's life be prolonged.
"She saved the lives of all the members of my family," said Mr. Hall, "and I owe it to her to do everything possible for her."
It was on July 8 last that the cat aroused Mrs. Hall by jumping on her bed and scratching her face with her claws and the knowledge that the house was on fire. Hall awakened her husband, and the four Hall children were hustled out of the house less than three minutes before it collapsed.
