N. Y. Taxi Rate War Centers Attention On Motor Car Costs
As a consequence of a taxi rate war in New York City resulting in fare reductions to an apparently destructive low point, it is natural for New Yorkers to measure the cost of ownership of an automobile against the cost of an equivalent mileage in this taxable use.

To meet the issue, an analysis of Franklin operating costs over various periods and for various mileages was made by the New York dealership with the following results:

The cost of ownership of a Franklin is 65 per cent less than the low cab fare when figured on a 20,000 mile per year basis; 66 per cent less than taxi fare on a 15,000 mile per year basis and 48 per cent less than the taxi rate where driving amounts to 10,000 miles per year.

Franklin entering into Franklin's per mile cost includes gasoline, oil, tires, repairs, depreciation, interest and insurance at probably the highest rate in the country.

FALL FATAL TO BEAUTY
NEW YORK (AP)—A leap or fall from a second story window of her home late Tuesday took the life of Mrs. Helen South Woodruff, authoress and playwright, declared by Penrhyn Stanlaws, the artist, to have been one of the most beautiful women in the world. Lewis B. Woodruff, her husband, is a noted lawyer and scientist.

Mrs. Woodruff, who was born at Solina, Alaska, 26 years ago, suffered for several years from nervous disorders, and for two years of the time was totally blind.

It was while blind that she wrote "The Lady of the Light House," the best seller of 1915, and gave the royalties to the New York Association for the Blind.

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—The indictment against Robert Rosebuth, charging him with the murder of Major Alexander Cronkhite at Camp Lewis in 1918, was dismissed Tuesday by Judge E. E. Osburn, on motion of James W. Osburn, special prosecutor.

NEW FUND TO BE ASKED
PENDLETON, Ore.—The use of half the money obtained in fines in liquor law violations for the use of the state in enforcing the liquor law will be asked of the legislature when it meets, Governor Pierce told an audience here in his third address for the day in Umatilla county.

By permitting one-half of the money paid in fines by bootleggers and moonshiners to revert back into a fund for fighting them, the state eventually would be able to drive the lawbreakers out of business and they would pay for their own downfall, he declared.

He also urged a vote for officers who would enforce the law. W. J. Herwig, president of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league, also spoke.
