

QUICK ACTION SAVED CHILD

LA GRANDE, Ore. (Special) — At the morning services at the Methodist church, eight conversions were made to the church, six by letter and two by confession of faith. At the evening service of the church for the year were installed.

Vernon Allen, who recently returned from Hot Lake where he was treated for a bad case of quinsy, is practically recovered and able to resume his work again. Saturday afternoon, while one of the cars from Union was on its way to Elgin to the football game, a serious accident was narrowly averted in Island City. Some children were playing in the street and one of the cars passed one of the boys, rushed out into the street to get an apple which another child had thrown. The Union car had turned out for another car going toward La Grande and the car rushed into the front of the machine. Supt. Roy Conklin was riding with the driver and he reached out and pushed the child away or he would have fallen directly underneath. As it was one wheel passed over his leg, but it is not thought that the injury was serious.

BAKER MAN IS CENSUS HEAD

BAKER, Ore. (Special) — Fred D. Entenille has been informed of his appointment as supervisor of census, district 4 of Oregon. District 4 includes all of Baker, Grant, Union, Wallowa, Umatilla, Morrow, Malheur, and Harney counties. It is the purpose of the government to take an extensive farm census during the coming winter months. Offices will be opened in Baker

where general headquarters for the district will be located. The supervisor will require approximately 15 enumerators and such clerks, stenographers and other help that becomes necessary.

It is expected that the work can be completed by late January. Actual enumeration will commence about November 15 and be rushed as quickly as possible.

All estimates of crops and livestock products made by the department of agriculture during the next five years will be based upon this census. It will be the basis of many plans for improving agricultural conditions. It is therefore of utmost importance that the census bureau receive every co-operation.

Mr. Entenille is a prominent local farmer and livestock breeder.

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He is a graduate of the local elementary and high school and a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College.

Assessed Valuation Increases. ALBANY, Ore. — Linn county's assessed valuation on this year's tax rolls has increased \$706,656, most of which is taken up by unimproved lands. An increase of 4 cents an acre on unimproved lands

mostly timber, caused the increase in valuation. A decrease in timber lands of 2 cents an acre was made possible by increasing the tax on timber lands. Stock held in stores also took a jump of \$181,000 for the year.

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
