THREE GIANTS NOT GUILTY

NEW YORK (AP)—Frank Fitch, George Kelly and Ross Young, New York Giant players implicated by Jimmy O'Connell in the latter's attempted bribery of Heinie Sand, Philadelphia shortstop, were exonerated of all connection with the scandal by Commissioner Landis because O'Connell's story did not "fit with the circumstances at the time of his action."

This was disclosed Wednesday by a source close to Commissioner Landis and established for the first time the real reason why, apart from their own denial, Fitch, Kelly and Young were cleared in the investigation which preceded the world's series.

According to this source, O'Connell's story of what happened before and after he approached Sand during the game at the Polo grounds, September 21, was diametrically opposite to that related by Sand and also the accounts given by the others called before Commissioner Landis.

Asked by Landis what he did after offering Sand \$500 to throw the game, O'Connell was said to have related that he walked to the batting cage and there told Kelly what happened. Then O'Connell, said, he took part in making practice.

According to Sand, however, O'Connell did not approach any other player at once, but went to the bench and sat alone in one corner.

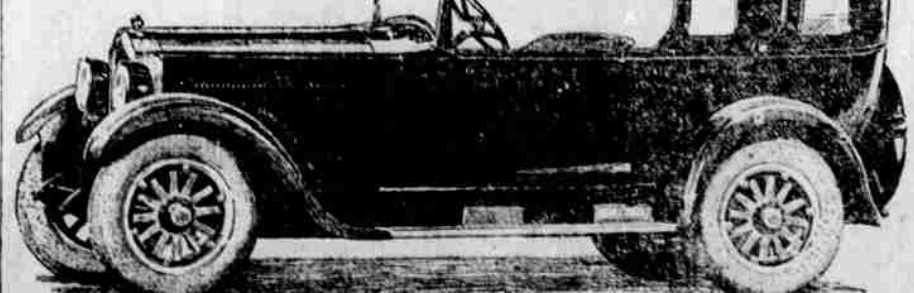
