BROAD INQUIRY PLAN OF BORAH

by a special committee of the United States senate, of which Senator William E. Borah, Republican, Idaho, is chairman.

While the committee was called to meet at this time because of the charges of Senator Robert M. La Follette, the independent presidential candidate, that the Republicans are raising a huge "slush fund" for use in doubtful states, Senator Borah said, after a conference with his colleagues, that the inquiry would be directed first at ascertaining the actual receipts and expenditures by the three major national political organizations, Republican, Democratic and Independent.

Representatives from each of these organizations have been asked, he said, to submit detailed statements on campaign finances up to this time. These will be studied carefully by the committee before an effort will be made to determine the full scope of the investigation, and it is to be pursued at places other than Chicago.

Walsh to Be Called.—Chairman Borah said that Frank P. Walsh of Kansas City, who has been selected by Senator La Follette to present his charges to the committee, would be called as soon as the preliminary phases of the investigation have been concluded. Mr. Walsh is expected to be on hand for the initial session of the committee.

How far the investigation might go or how long it might last, Senator Borah was unable to predict.

"The committee will examine every legitimate lead presented by spokesmen for any of the candidates, and our inquiry will be exhaustive in every detail," Senator Borah said. "We shall ask each party organization to report to whom they have received, from whom, and how, it has been spent. Our reports will not deal with items

totals, but with detailed contributions and expenditures. In the first instance, our examination will be merely of the reports submitted in response to our requests, but if these reports suggest further inquiry of any kind, we may request the accounting books of the campaign headquarters."

Tapping upon the La Follette charges, Senator Borah said that if any evidence were offered by the La Follette forces, it would be received by the committee at some convenient place, probably in the east. Should witnesses be available in Chicago, however, the entire inquiry will be prosecuted there, but if it develops, as Senator Borah anticipates, that witnesses for Senator La Follette are from eastern states, the investigation will be transferred to Washington.

Senator Borah said he had not been advised as to who would be selected by the several organizations to represent them before the committee. At western Democratic headquarters here it was stated that the whole matter is in the hands of National Chairman Shaver, who is expected here from Washington in a few days.

Chairman Butler of the Republican national committee and William Hodges, the national treasurer, have prepared a report for the committee which will be submitted by a representative. It was stated, however, that Mr. Butler and Mr. Hodges would be prepared to appear, possibly, before the committee at some time later, if specially requested to do so.

La Follette Chief Ready.—John M. Nelson, Senator La Follette's field marshal, declared he was ready to present, personally, at any time, to the committee, a statement of the names of contributors, if the investigators desired. He added that his statement will include not only an accounting
