



WHIPPLE, Ariz. (Special)—Two hundred patients at the United States Veterans' Bureau Hospital here, who were threatened with the loss of the franchise, will be allowed to vote as the result of court action taken in their behalf by American Legion officials.

The challenge to the veterans' right to vote here was raised by John E. Russell and Judge Daniel E. Parks, local attorneys, who demanded that the names of nearly two hundred patients at the Veterans' Bureau hospital be stricken from the great register on the grounds, first, that the men were residents of a military reservation and had no right of suffrage, and second, that they were inmates of an asylum kept at public expense and had no right to vote. Petitioners, which were filed in behalf of the patients by George W. Nelson, a member of the American Legion, American Legion Commission, were sustained in all points by Judge Richard Lanning.

EL PASO, Texas (Special)—Five Chinese from this vicinity applied to the American Legion office here for Federal Adjusted Compensation blanks which the legion is supplying and filling out for world war veterans. When asked the question, "Who do you want to give your money to if you should die, your wife?" one of the orientals replied, "My last three wives in China, one in Mexico, three very much all wife, like very much you give 'em all wives," he then picked up four compensation blanks from the adjacent desk and with impulsive motion indicated that Uncle Sam should reimburse his four wives each and every one alike in case of their provider's demise.

NEW YORK, N. Y. (Special)—The Victory Hall, established as the means of maintaining the employment and welfare work of the American Legion in New York county, will take place this year at the Waldorf-Astoria, on Armistice eve, Nov. 10. Social and military leaders are expected to give the hall their enthusiastic support and already fifty patronesses and twenty-five patrons have accepted invitations.

SPRINGFIELD, O. (Special)—Nicholas Stankevitch, highest decorated man in the Russian army recently ended a new domination to his life when he joined the American Legion post here, making him the youngest legionnaire in the world as he is not yet 21 years old.

Stankevitch left Chicago in 1914 with his father and both enlisted in the Russian army, he being only 12 years old at the time. The same year which recently wounded his father, he was killed.

He was one of the 295 survivors of 30,000 Russians who resisted the Austrian drive. The young lieutenant can speak and read in five languages. Most foreign newspapers praise his indignation, declared Lieutenant Stankevitch, because of their generally antagonistic attitude towards the United States.

The young veteran has been searching among Russian people for his mother from whom he has been separated by the events of the war.

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special)—The American Legion's program of rehabilitation will be continued for another year under the direction of Walter B. Miller of this city who was reappointed chairman of the National Rehabilitation committee at the conclusion of the 81st Annual Convention of the legion at St. Paul by the newly elected national commander, James A. Irwin.

Chairman Miller is now on a tour of the western half of the United States where he will personally visit every Veterans' Bureau hospital in which veterans of the late war are receiving treatment. Mr. Miller will return to Washington, D. C., for the opening of the winter session of congress to devote all of his time to ward carrying forward the legion's recommendations in behalf of the world war disabled.

ATLANTA, Ga. (Special)—State Commander J. R. Fitzpatrick of the American Legion recently returned from the national convention at St. Paul, announced that the Woodrow Wilson Memorial college to be established at Valdosta, as proposed by the Georgia department, received unqualified endorsement on the floor of the convention. Commander Fitzpatrick declared, "The endorsement by the national convention of the department of Georgia's main project, the Woodrow Wilson Memorial college, means that the legion in every state and territorial possession has accepted that it is approved, and the members stand ready to aid in the big undertaking."

In one cottage where a couple have lived for 55 years and brought up 13 children, there has not been a death for over 50 years, and in five adjoining cottages only eight people have died in 55 years. The village lies in a sleepy hollow four miles from a railway station.

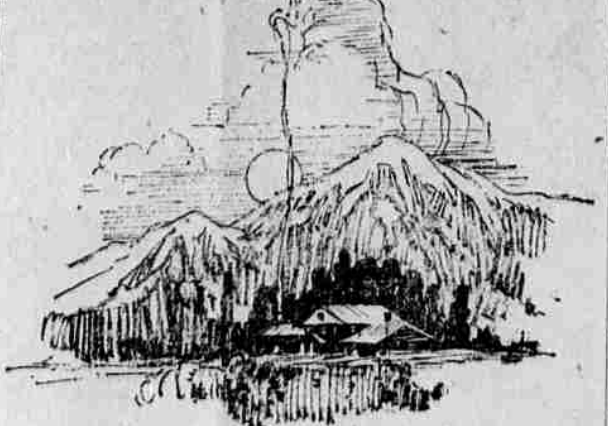
ASSESSOR OVER TRACES

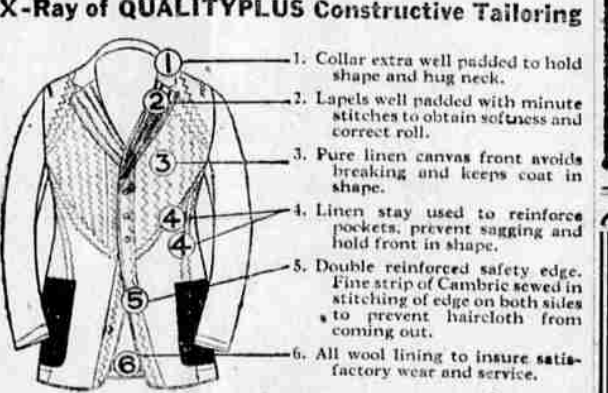

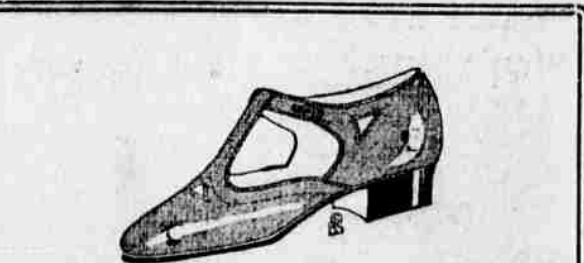
