COOLIDGE FOR UNITY IN U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President and Mrs. Coolidge were host and hostess at a breakfast today to forty actors and actresses, members of the Coolidge-Dawes Theatrical League.

The breakfast was arranged to support the president. Coolidge assured the visitors the doors of the White House were open to them "at least until March fourth."

WASHINGTON (AP)—America can add most in settling world troubles and in developing its own standard. President Coolidge told a delegation of foreign-born citizens Thursday, by continuing "as an example and a demonstration that peace, harmony, cooperation and a truly national patriotic sentiment may be established and perpetuated on an American scale."

Those who cast in their lot with this country can be true to the land of their origin only by first being true to America," he said. "We can be in a position to help only by uniting the American nation, building it up, making it strong, keeping it independent, using its inclination to help and discrimination to inspire."

The president said this country welcomed newcomers, as it had in the past, but it had now been found necessary by restrictive immigration to protect those already here as well as those who would come.

The immigration law, he added, should not be considered a reflection on any race or creed.

EMPLOYEES ARE GIVEN BAK

SAN FRANCISCO (By the Associated Press)—A plan whereby the 2200 employees of the Bank of Italy, a \$250,000,000 institution, are to take over control of the bank, has been approved by the board of directors. It was announced Thursday to the Associated Press by A. P. Giannini, president. The plan will go into effect on January 1.

As a preliminary move, Mr. Giannini will retire Friday as president, and James A. MacLaughlin, the present senior vice president, will succeed him as head of the institution.

WEST LINN RACE WARM

OREGON CITY, Ore. — There will be two candidates in the field for mayor of West Linn, two for the city recorder's office and one for the chief of police, and from indications this year's city election will be the warmest in the history of West Linn.

Charles Shields, present mayor, will be candidate for another term. He is to be opposed by Frank Hammon, L. F. Porter, who has been city treasurer for a number of years, is to be opposed by Garland Holloway, who is connected with the Bank of Commerce, and resident of West Linn for several years. Peter Winkel, ex-merchant of West Linn, is seeking the chief of police position.

\$2657 DAMAGES ASKED

PENDLETON, Ore. — Damages of \$2657.50 were asked by Harry Morse in a suit that has been filed in circuit court against the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. Mr. Morse set forth in his complaint that the defendant company stretched a gray cable across an old road on Telephone ridge as a brace to a pole. The horse stumbled over the wire on its hind legs along the road just after dusk, he claimed, and he was thrown over the horse's head, broke his arm and was otherwise bruised.

Going Up!

Mrs. H. Loughlin has let a contract for building a garage to C. D. Goodnough and the permit was taken out this morning. The garage will be built on the alley between Washington and Adams avenues at a cost of \$200.

William Fitzgerald will alter and repair a garage on X avenue between Greenwood and Fir streets at a cost of \$25.

Mr. La Follette's strength, whether drawn more largely from the Republican or Democratic ranks, continues to stir a good many of the political prophets and seers.

"In concluding the table of 'How the Same Voters Voted in 1920,' some observers of the poll have called attention to the large size of the 'Did-Not-Vote' column. In this column, it must be explained, is included both those who specify that they did not vote and those who fail to mention their political allegiance in 1920.

Details Given.

"A more complicated tabulation kept in 'The Digest's' polling-room shows in more detail the trend of the vote. Thus, in California, according to this tabulation, Mr. La Follette draws his large vote chiefly from 12,582 former Democrats and 22,158 former Republicans, while 4382 former Democrats are registered as voting for Coolidge, and 1569 former Republicans are in the Democratic column.

"Turning to an eastern state, New York, where La Follette has shown considerable strength, it appears that he draws 25,844 votes from former Republicans to 11,654 from former Democrats.

"In Iowa he is credited with 11,187 formerly Republican votes and 3887 formerly Democratic. In Wisconsin, his home state, his present vote includes ballots from 29,206 former Republicans and 1634 former Democrats; in Pennsylvania, 12,945 former Republicans and 3751 former Democrats.

"In this connection it must be remembered that 1920 was a strongly Republican year, so that there is a small indication in these figures that the Progressive candidate's strength is being contributed exclusively by one party, as several partisans have announced.

"It is also noteworthy that, in spite of Mr. La Follette's large vote, he has so far carried only the state of Wisconsin, with California added, granting that the present poll has a somewhat larger percentage of error in favor of the Republicans than was shown in the smaller poll of 1920.

"A democratic paper finds in the registration of the previous election of the poll voters which is now given as 1,676,005 Republicans to 441,251 Democrats, a sign that no Democrat could possibly win in the poll.

"It may be said, also, that no Democrat can win in the election unless a considerable number of the Republicans of 1920 change their politics.

Political Divisions

"The cleavage of the country was divided, roughly in 1920 between 1,600,000 Republicans and 3,000,000 Democratic voters, with only a small third-party vote less than 1,000,000 for the Socialist candidate to complete the issue.

What shifts, then, are now being made from Republican to Democratic ranks, or from Democratic to Republican, that will show that the verdict of 1920 is to be reversed, or repeated?

"A glance at the table comparing the 1920 and 1924 columns, shows a Republican increase in thirty-two of the states, while sixteen show a Democratic increase. Ten states on the other hand, show a Democratic increase over 1920, while a loss in Democratic vote during the last four years is indicated in thirty-eight states. Some of these gains and losses are very large, some so small as to mean little.

Among the more significant changes there appear to have been Republican losses in Iowa, Illinois, Pennsylvania, California, Minnesota and Wisconsin. Republican gains are indicated in many of the states of the "Solid South," where such increases will, in all probability, be repeated.

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"Both Democratic and Progressive partisans have argued that the Digest's polls tend to favor the Republican candidate by approximately 10 per cent, and several editors produce figures from previous polls to back up their arguments. This alleged percentage of error, of course, may or may not exist, but it is noteworthy that, even granting its existence, it would make a change in the political complexion of only three states.

"California would be transferred from the Coolidge to the La Follette column, Kentucky and Oklahoma would go to the Democrats, and West Virginia, Mr. Davis' home state, would show practically a tie vote between Coolidge and La Follette.

"A feature of the voting in California is that, since the tabulation published a week ago, Coolidge has received 5119 in La Follette's column, a proportion which seems to indicate a slight rise for the week at least, in the California popularity of the Progressive candidate.

wholesale bakery. His next venture was the catering business which he started on his own account, and in a few years he was the owner of a string of lunch counters and bakeries.

In 1892 he disposed of his restaurant business and purchased from William Penn Nixon a half interest in the Chicago Inter-Ocean, of which he became business manager. In 1895 he sold his share of the paper.

On the death of James W. Scott, Mr. Kohlsaat purchased the Chicago Times-Herald and the Chicago Evening Post and became editor of both papers, continuing that capacity until 1901, when he took over the Chicago Record-Herald. At the same time he sold the Chicago Evening Post to John C. Schaffey.

Retires from Journalism.

Mr. Kohlsaat remained at the helm of the Record-Herald until 1902, when he turned the property over to others and devoted himself to his real estate interests. Eight years later he again took charge of the Record-Herald, which he continued to direct until October, 1912, when he purchased the Chicago Inter-Ocean from George W. Hinman and became its editor, a position he held for a year, when the paper changed hands and he retired from active journalism.

In 1880 Mr. Kohlsaat married Mabel E. Blake of Chicago, and two daughters were the result of the union. One of them is the wife of Potter Palmer, Jr.

Mr. Kohlsaat presented a statue of General U. S. Grant to the city of Chicago and gave liberally to charity. Since 1912 he spent most of his time in New York and Europe, although he maintained his Chicago home. In 1922 he published his personal recollections of his association with "Presidents from President McKinley to President Harding.
