Seattle Pacific Coast Ball Team Enthroned as the 1924 Champions; Are to Play St. Paul.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The Seattle club won the Pacific Coast baseball league championship Sunday as a result of its victory over Portland in the first game of a double header, and the loss by San Francisco and Los Angeles of a game each to Oakland and Vernon, respectively.

Seattle's lead in the league is approximately a game and a half. Los Angeles and San Francisco almost tied for second place with Los Angeles a shade ahead that figures out to a matter of several decimal points. Oakland finished fourth.

The victorious Seattle team did not have to win Sunday provided both San Francisco and Los Angeles lost a game each. For good measure Seattle did win the first game against Portland, however, by a score of 12 to 4. The second game was lost by Seattle, 1 to 15. It was called at the end of the sixth because of darkness.

After winning the first game against Vernon Sunday morning, Los Angeles had hopes of winning the second game and that Seattle would lose both. The Angels drubbed the Tigers 4 to 1 in the first game and surrendered the second by 2 to 5.

San Francisco lost the morning contest to Oakland, 3 to 11, and won the second contest, 7 to 6. Seattle now expects to play the St. Paul club, champions of the American association for the minor league championship at Seattle in the near future.

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Idaho and Stanford, two of the four teams tied for the lead in the Pacific coast football conference play Saturday on Multnomah field in one of the important conference games. Idaho exhibited a powerful offense against Washington State Friday, running up three touchdowns in the last period and winning from the Cougars, 15 to 7.

Stanford opened its conference season against Oregon at Palo Alto Saturday with a 28 to 13 victory. Although California is supposed to have a weak team, according to Bear stories from the south, the Golden Bears defeated the Olympic club by a larger score Saturday than did Stanford the week before. California defeated Olympic club, 1 to 7, while Stanford won only by 7 to 6.

Washington continued its drive and scored 22 points to seven for Moriana. Southern California had no difficulty in downing the Oregon Aggies on Multnomah field, 17 to 3.

In the east, Gil Doble's Cornell team lost its second game in two weeks, Rutgers turning the trick by a 19 to 0 score. Princeton had its hands full downing the navy, 15 to 14, while Yale and Dartmouth played a 14 to 14 tie.

Harvard found Holy Cross hard to beat and just managed to squeak over a 12 to 6 victory. The Army lost a close game to Notre Dame, 13 to 7. Columbia, under Percy Haughton, famous Harvard coach, gave Pennsylvania an awful score, the Quakers winning 19 to 7. Penn plays California New Year's day at Berkeley. Syracuse, which plays Southern California at Los Angeles, December 6, defeated Boston college, 19 to 0.

In the middle west there were two big upsets. Michigan's 14 to 29 defeat by Illinois was the worst drubbing a Yost team has suffered in years. In the other, Nebraska which plays the Oregon Aggies at Lincoln, Thanksgiving day, defeated Colgate, 33 to 7. Minnesota and Wisconsin played a 7 to 7 tie; Purdue defeated Northwestern, 5 to 3, and Chicago won from Indiana, 29 to 3.

SOEPA, Bulgaria. (AP)—"All Russia is playing football," said Dr. John L. Nelson, bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church, on his arrival here from a tour of Russia, on his way to the United States. "Not only in the large cities are they kicking the piskin, but I saw them playing football with ardor in some of the smallest villages through which I passed on my tour."

"What is true of football is true also of other forms of outdoor sport in the Soviet republic. In one little village I saw a fine gymnasium, equipped with improved appliances. Young Russia is developing physically."



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
