"The Next Corner" Starts at Arcade Today.

This, the comment of Jesse L. Lasky, first vice president in charge of production of the Famous Players-Lasky Corp., was made as the casting director of the West Coast studio handed him for his O. K. the assignment of the West Coast's latest Paramount production, "The Next Corner," which opens a three-day run at the Arcade theater today.

In addition to the unusual number of nationalities represented in the cast, scenes in New York, England, France, Spain and the Argentine Republic, figure prominently in this adaptation of Kate Jordan's famous novel.

The United States is represented by Dorothy Mackall, who, though British born, has dwelled upon the good old U. S. A. as the land of her adoption. Conway Tearle, Ian Chaney and Louise Dresser, are also Americans. Evelyn "Gertie" Spanish born, takes the role of her own nationality, that of a young Spanish nobleman. All the aforementioned appear in featured roles in the production.

Australia is represented in the cast by Dorothy Cumming. She is cast as the irascible favorite of a Spanish nobleman, a beauty of Paris who uses her to hoodwink the fascinating American with whom he is madly in love.

A typically continental type is introduced in the picture in the person of Sylvia Madzia, who was born in Moscow, Russia. She is cast as a courtesan, whose character near the end of the picture is the scene of later fashionable cathartics.

The cast, though exceptional, is only in keeping with the greatness of the production, which was adapted to the screen by Monte M. Katterjohn.

"Little Robinson Crusoe" Is Big Hit at Sherrys.

Seemingly there is no end to the possibilities of Jackie Coogan's genius as an actor, no limit to his powers of appeal. He is at the Sherry theatre in a production, supervised by Jack Coogan, Sr., and directed by its principal element by Eddie Cline. It is called—with far more propriety than most pictures are named—"Little Robinson Crusoe" and it is a story written expressly for little Jackie by Willard Mack.

It is a thrilling success. That was the overwhelming and enthusiastic verdict of yesterday's audience.

It begins in San Francisco where, at the opening of the story, the hero, little Mickey Hoagan, is found bereaved of his father. The latter, a member of San Francisco police, was killed. The boy is now fatherless, as well as motherless.

The story opens as the lad is being made ready for a long journey to Australia where he is to be cared for by a sister of his mother. The voyage is abruptly ended in mid-ocean. The ship is wrecked in a typhoon and all hands on board, except little Mickey Hoagan, are drowned. There, similarly, is the "Robinson Crusoe" story be-

gina. The boy saves the ship's cat and together they are cast up on an island in the South Seas.

But, unlike the Robinson Crusoe, this place is inhabited—emphatically so, Mickey no sooner reconciles himself to a life on a deserted island than the cannibals and the thrills and the fun appear. What happens then must be seen to be appreciated, and nothing that a reviewer could write would adequately describe the events from the moment Mickey is discovered by the savages to the moment of his escape from a violent death at the hands of the tribe's chief, Marimbo.

The plot is not too elaborate nor complicated and it revolves around one character—that impersonated by Jackie. It is a perfect combination for Jackie—thrill follows laugh only to be followed by chuckles, more thrills and a dash or two of pathos—being sure, of course, that a happy ending closes the story. Indeed, it is the happiest ending that was ever provided for Jackie.
