34 Cars and Cabs Now Have Brakes of Transmission Type

A recent trend in automobile brake design, which is the outcome probably of a serious study of braking methods a year ago, is the increased use of the transmission type brake.

The extent to which various engineering groups now agree on the practicability of a brake on the main drive line and operating through the differential and axle, is indicated by the fact that the total number of cars and taxicabs using the transmission type brake for either service or emergency braking purposes has now reached 24.

The transmission type brake with its inherent advantages of high braking power, light foot pedal pressure, non-skid action and permanency of adjustment due to simple mechanism, had as its earliest exponent the light weight, flexible Franklin. The extent to which Franklin engineers have developed braking efficiency with this system since 1906 is indicated by present Franklin stopping ability that surpasses the accepted safety standards by from 49 to 67 percent at various speeds.

LESSON NO. 2 THE PROPER USE OF LIGHT HOW WE SEE. Objects are seen by the light that falls upon them and is reflected to our eyes. A dark object reflects but little of the light that falls upon it—perhaps less than one-fourth; a light colored object reflects a large part of the light—perhaps three-quarters. If we are to see objects, the light must fall upon them and be reflected from them. The more darkly they are colored, the more light is needed to enable us to see them. The light that falls on objects which we wish to see may be termed useful light. Most electric lamps have reflectors that throw out light in all directions—just as much to the ceiling and walls of a room as down to the table-top. Well designed shades are made so that they not only soften the light, but also reflect some light that would otherwise be wasted and direct it downward and outward to the objects that we wish to see.
