Soviet Russia Eliminating Holidays for Its Workers

LONDON. (AP).—Soviet Russia is becoming a little less each year, it is said, the paradise for the workman that it started out to be. This is particularly so in the matter of working days, as shown by figures published by the Russian trade delegation.

The workers of Russia now labor 269 days out of the year while in 1921 they were compelled to work only 221 to be law-abiding citizens. Last year the holidays recognized by the government and Sundays gave the workers 192 days of leisure, which is 33 less than they had in 1921.

In 1922 the working hours for each man were 1,948, an average of less than eight hours a working day. Under the czar the working hours averaged about 2,100 a year.

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Hillsboro Schools Grow.
HILLSBORO, Ore. (AP).—The Hillsboro city schools, in the summary of the report for the first month show an increase of 75 over the same time last year. Fifty of these are in the grades and 25 in the high school. Six are taking post-graduate work in commercial and teacher training. In the latter subject several outside towns are used for practice work owing to the size of the class. The schools have added a projector with a daylight screen for instruction work.

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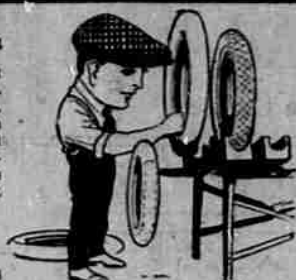
