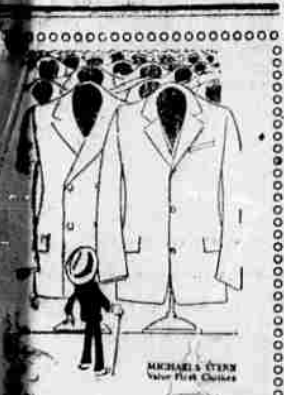

Of the \$2,700,329.20 total cost, Union county has contributed approximately \$650,000 and is delinquent in the payment of an additional amount of agreed co-operation to the extent of approximately \$200,000.

The statement of costs above given does not include the grading of the sections between La Grande and Hot Lake and between La Grande and Island City, which the county agrees to Union county and paid for by the county. Neither does it include the cost of survey and the cost of maintenance work performed during the past six or seven years, both of which items of expense have been borne by the state in their entirety.

We trust that the information given will prove sufficient for your purpose.

As chairman of the joint committee on agricultural appropriations he secured appropriations totaling \$11,128,197 for the improvement of Oregon's highways, forest roads and trails, which is \$1,691,252 more than Washington received, and \$1,259,962 more than Idaho received during the same period.

He secured an appointment to the war finance corporation authorizing the advancement of funds to farmers and livestock men so that they could carry their products until they could be sold.

He secured appropriations for governmental experts to make a study of the walnut, cranberry, and broccoli industries, a fruit station for the Rogue River valley, a government employment service at Salem and Eugene for agricultural producers, and the person system of broadcasting, pest, weather and crop reports.

He assisted in the passage of the Intermediate Credit act.

Senator McNary supported adjusted compensation for world war veterans, and the Burns and Knutson pension bills.

He supported woman's suffrage and has always stood for rigid enforcement of the prohibition and narcotic laws.

Senator McNary has attained a prestige in the senate that is of incalculable value to the future development of Oregon. It would take a new man years to attain his committee assignments and position of influence in the senate.
