Victors in Saturday Contest Started the Season with About Same Prospects as La Grande.

La Grande high school's football eleven was given quite a setback Saturday when Wallowa trimmed them 12 to 6. Of course, that is ancient history now, but even yet some of the fellows are trying to analyze just what the trouble was. My opinion is that over-confidence and too much horseplay in practice prior to the game is about as clear a solution as any. Of course, that's only second-guessing and second-guessing has its faults. At any rate, about the only thing left to do is get ready for Baker, Pendleton and Boise and try to make a better showing. 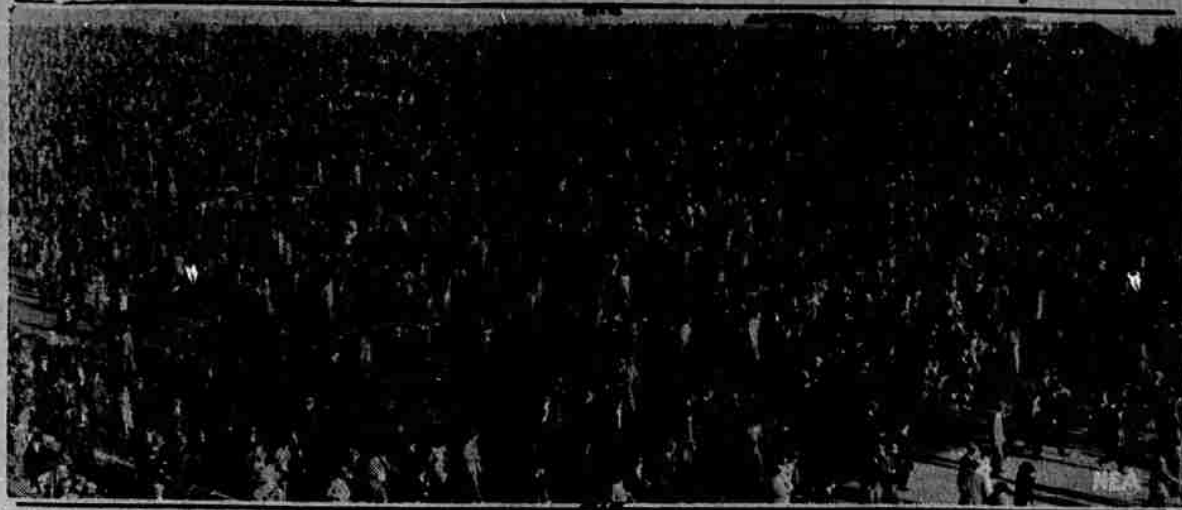
One explanation for the defeat is exploded in a few words from Coach Eaman, of Wallowa. Before the game Saturday the fans here believed that Wallowa's team was a veteran aggregation. That was not the case.

"Of the thirteen men who played Saturday but five were first string men last year. Others had had no experience whatever, except in one-second team game with Union last year. Still others had never played in any football game of any kind until the game with Joseph a week prior to the La Grande game," stated Coach Eaman to the writer.

Continuing, he said that "La Grande did not lose because of the greater experience of the Wallowa team; La Grande has four of last year's team—we have five and I will leave it to you if La Grande's four were not better than Wallowa's five a year ago."

From that it begins to look as if La Grande and Wallowa both started the season with about the same material and the same pros-

Baker and Pendleton and Boise all won the same day La Grande lost. Baker's defeat of Union, 13 to 9, was not imposing but Pendleton showed considerable strength against Hermiton, downing that team 24 to 6. Boise literally ate up little Wilder, sending over touchdown after touchdown.

Another surprise, just as potent as the Wallowa defeat of La Grande, came Saturday when North Powder high school's eleven ran over Prairie City at Prairie City 13 to 6.

North Powder has a whip of a team this year and if they go on at the present rate, may surprise all Eastern Oregon. In four games, their goal line was not crossed once but they scored 24 times—for a

total of 158 points to their opponents 9. On dope the Powder team is rated stronger than Baker.

One of the big games of the season will be played Friday, November 14, when Wallowa high school plays at North Powder. Wallowa defeated La Grande and, of course, is ranked among the strongest. But North Powder's victory over Prairie City was likewise imposing and if they defeat Wallowa, can easily claim the championship of Union and Wallowa counties. Then on the following Friday they play Baker at North Powder and stand a good chance to take a fall out of the Queen City team.

Football fans will be watching Coach H. Regele's squad with much interest this year.

HAITIAN BROAD JUMPER OUT TO MAKE RECORDS

PARIS (AP).—To hold the undisputed broad jump championship of the African race is the life's ambition of Sylvio P. Cator, of Port-au-Prince, Haiti, who recently shattered the French rec-

ord with a leap of 7 metres and 30 centimetres, or practically 24 feet.

For this purpose Cator has placed himself under the direction of Trainer Quilgars of the Racing Club of France with the avowed intention of bettering the marks of De Hart Hubbard and Ned Gourdin, the two American negroes who, until Bob Legendre's tremendous jump of 25 feet 6 inches during the Olympic games, held most of the leaping honors.

Cator came to France last June to represent Haiti in the Olympic games, but, like "Dick" Hyland of California, the American Olympic rugby player, he decided to enter school in France and incidentally to get the benefit of French training methods to improve his athletic performances as well as his studies.

His best jump during the Olympic competition was seven metres ten. Quilgars says the Haitian is improving every day, and he has hopes that he may spring to will associate seven metres fifty regularly.

Von Tirpitz May Disclose Details of Loss of Lusitana

BERLIN (AP).—Details hitherto unpublished concerning the inside facts leading up to the sinking of the Lusitana have been promised in a new book to be issued soon by Admiral von Tirpitz, the former navy head, who has been credited with having given

the final order which resulted in the destruction of the steamer.

According to the announcements, Admiral von Tirpitz, now leader of the Nationalists in the Reichstag, has consented to the publication of all the secret archives in his possession, which cover some 20 years prior to 1914.

Tirpitz appeared some years ago and caused quite a stir despite his tone of reservation, but in the new volume the admiral, it is said, has promised to "tell it all."

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
